**Constitution Model  
Appears in Show  
of Marine Art**

**Williams' Collection of Prints  
and Oils of Nautical Sub-  
jects Also on View.**

The collection of Max Williams, placed on view yesterday in the galleries of the American Art Association, is devoted entirely to marine subjects, including prints, paintings and models of famous ships; the exhibition being preparatory to a sale on May 5. The ship models are specimens of fine craftsmanship. Perhaps the most interesting of all is that of the famous Constitution.

Pictures and prints like those shown make a double appeal, to the decorator and to the historian. They have generally been preserved in the first instance by a public that accepted them as being literally true descriptions of great boats or great events. The more sophisticated second generation laughs at such things a little and loves them for their quaintness. By the time they last into a third generation the connoisseurs decide that they are both truthful and quaint and guard the prints for both reasons.

Among the paintings is an interesting portrait of the "Battle of Lepanto" by Salvat or Rosa. This battle, in 1571, in what was known as the Last Crusade, was fought to dispel the sea power of the Turks in the Eastern Mediterranean. The Turkish fleet fought mostly with arrows, and this is said to be the last important engagement in which bows were used in Europe. Many celebrated men assisted the Christian allies in this battle, and among others Cervantes, the great Spanish novelist, is known to have had his left hand shattered in this conflict. Other marine paintings are by Dodd, Whitcomb, Pocock, Legrand and Buttersworth.

The prints comprise examples by most of the prominent English marine engravers of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, representing the era of Nelson, Rodney and Howe. There are sets of prints of the "Battle of the Nile" and the "Battle of Camperdown," as well as several illustrating the history of the slave trade. The American impressions include specimens of the "Constitution and Guerriere," the "Exploit on Lake Erie" and many that relate to the Civil War.

The ship models are interesting specimens of fine craftsmanship, apart from their special interest to students of things nautical. The famous Constitution also appears among these models, perhaps the most interesting of all.

The books sold were principally first editions of early English and later literature.

At yesterday's session No. 1649, a magnificent illustrated book relating to the romantic adventures of the Knight Templar chivalry for Emperor Maximilian, was sold to Gabriel Weiss for \$410, the highest price of the day. J. F. Drake paid \$230 for No. 1650, a first edition of Tinkeray's "Vanity Fair" and M. Wolf bought No. 1651, the first English treatise on drawing and painting and of printing and preparation of colors by Richard Tottill for \$240. Other prices ranged mostly between \$100 and \$300.
