

TURKISH DELEGATES ON ROAD TO PARIS

Leave Constantinople Without Power to Sign Peace Treaty.

LED BY TEWFIK PASHA

Nationalists in Empire Will Fight Hard Against Conditions Imposed.

By the Associated Press. Constantinople, May 1.—The Turkish peace delegation started for Paris this morning on a special train and is expected to reach the French capital within two days. Mamoud Muktar Pasha, the War Minister, is in Switzerland and will join the party en route.

The delegation goes without power to sign the treaty. Damad Ferid Pasha, the Grand Vizier, being the only official the Allies will instruct with that power, and his presence in Constantinople is necessary to direct the lagging effort to send proposals against Mustafa Kemal Pasha, the Nationalist leader.

Tewfik Pasha, former Foreign Minister, who will head the peace delegation, will make an earnest appeal for modification of the terms imposed by the Allies. Greece control of practically all the Thrace and Smyrna districts, is demanded here, is a condition which even the Entente dominated Government of Damad Ferid Pasha cannot subscribe

to without a vigorous protest. It is generally believed in Constantinople that it is immaterial whether the present Government signs the peace treaty, as the Nationalists are determined to fight against execution of the peace terms.

The Nationalists are entrenched so thoroughly in Anatolia that they cannot be dislodged unless the Entente Powers send invading forces far larger than are at present available in the Levant. The British have about 50,000 men in the vicinity of Constantinople, which is barely enough to police the Turkish capital and the eastern coast of Marmora.

The Greeks in the Smyrna area number 100,000 and are reported to have another 100,000 available for Thrace and Anatolia. Estimates of Mustafa Kemal Pasha's organized forces vary from 50,000 to 200,000.

Quiet is reigning momentarily in Anatolia, where Turkish Nationalist troops under Mustafa Kemal are under arms. An official statement issued by Mustafa Kemal says: "We are fighting on three fronts, Armenia, Cilicia and along the shore of the Sea of Marmora, but temporarily we must be quiet on the Aidin front."

Greeks are holding the line in Aidin. Relations between the Nationalists and the Italians are very cordial, and it is reported the latter are providing Mustafa Kemal with ammunition.

POLAND RECOGNIZES AND AIDS UKRAINIA

Forces of Two Countries Join Against Bolsheviki.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Poland has recognized the independence of Ukrainia under the directorate of Gen. Petura the Polish Legation was advised to-day. This action was forecast several days ago in press dispatches from Warsaw reporting that a treaty had been agreed upon. Since then the Polish and Ukrainian forces have cooperated in a successful drive against the Bolsheviki in the direction of Kiev.

The Polish Legation's address said, had issued a proclamation calling on Ukrainians to assist the Poles in their campaign against the Bolsheviki and emphasizing the importance of Polish aid in liberating Ukrainia.
