NEW PROVISIONS FOR INJURED SERVICE MEN

They Are Urged to Get Certificate Within Year.

The attention of former service men who were injured or who contracted disease while in the service is called by R. G. Cholmeley Jones, director of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, to the new provisions for compensation and for medical and surgical care. Even though the injury or disease was of minor character, the men are asked to be sure to apply to the bureau for a certificate of injury within one year after the date of their discharge, in order to protect themselves and their dependents against possible aggravation of the trouble.
