### ROMIG, BERGDOLL'S FRIEND, ARRESTED

Charged With Helping Slacker to Evade Draft Law.

### RELEASED ON \$5,000 BOND

Mother of Escaped Prisoner Furnishes Bail for Business Agent.

PHILADELPHIA, May 27.—James M. Romig, close personal friend and business agent for the Bergdoll family, was arrested to-night charged with aiding Grover C. Bergdoll in evading military service during the war.

Romig, unattended by counsel, presented himself at the office of H. B. Pierce, superintendent of the Philadelphia division of the Department of Justice.

Then to prevent his being held in prison for one night, Federal agents whisked their prisoner to the home of Howard M. Long, United States Commissioner, there in a hearing behind closed doors. Mrs. Emma C. Bergdoll, mother of the slacker, entered \$5,000 bond for the appearance of Romig at a hearing at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning before H. R. Manley, the United States Commissioner, who issued the warrant upon which the arrest was made.

Romig is a friend of the Bergdoll family. He is alleged to have been with Bergdoll a part of the time at Hagerstown, Md., when Bergdoll was being sought all over the country for evading the draft. He was also with Bergdoll at the latter's home Friday when Bergdoll, who was released temporarily from Fort Jay, where he was serving a five-year sentence, slipped away from two army sergeants and disappeared in his automobile. Romig denied that he had any knowledge of Bergdoll's intentions.

### BERGDOLL REPORTED IN BOSTON STATION

Disguised as Woman He May Have Gone to Montreal.

BOSTON, May 27.—A report that Grover Cleveland Bergdoll had been seen in the North Station dressed in women's clothes and a squad of policemen rushing to the station to-day. They did not find Bergdoll, but a railroad police officer told them a "woman" answering the description of the fugitive, had been about a squad of policemen thought she might have boarded a Montreal train. Steps were taken to have the train searched at some point en route to Montreal.

A later report that the suspect had been seen leaving the station left some doubt in the minds of the police as to whether "she" had boarded the Montreal train. Special Officer Wallen said that the "woman" he noticed was accompanied by a man. They first went to a public telephone booth, but did not use the telephone so far as he was able to see. They then left the station. He noticed the "woman" particularly because of her large feet and ankles, he said.

### RAILROAD CLERKS IN ATLANTA STRIKE

Employees of Four Lines Walk Out in Sympathy With Fifth.

ATLANTA, May 27.—Union clerks on the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, Georgia Railroad, the Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic and the Southern Railway walked out this afternoon in sympathy with the strike of clerks of the Central of Georgia Railroad, according to railroad officials. The Seaboard Air Line was not affected.

Representatives of the roads said clerks and other employees in warehouses, terminals and yards were affected. No statement could be obtained from representatives of the clerks.

J. W. Bridwell, Federal mediator, and leading officials of the Central of Georgia Railroad, as well as officers of the clerks union, were in Macon to-day attending a conference which, union leaders said, would determine whether the strike would spread generally throughout the Southeast.

### HOME BUDGET SHOWN IN WAGE INQUIRY

Labor Board Told Costs Exceed Trainmen's Salaries.

CHICAGO, May 27.—Railroad employees of the United States must get prompt wage increases, regardless of cost to the carriers, on the entire railway industry will face complete disruption, W. N. Doak, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, declared to-day before the Railway Labor Board, which is conducting hearings into the demands of the employees.

### FUEL FAMINE SEEN IF RAIL PLANS FAIL

A. H. Smith Warns Coal Men at Association Meeting.

ATLANTIC CITY, May 27.—A. H. Smith, president of the New York Central, in an address to the National Coal Association, said to-night that unless some way is found to get enough cars and equipment the entire country will undergo a terrible famine next winter.

"We have been telling our country about the lack of car facilities and they would not believe us," he said. "But we are in it worse than you are, because we are fellows getting shot at all the time, and I can tell you that is no fun."

The number of hikers in this country is as great as the population, and they have a right to kick because we are not giving them the things they need. We are going to have a great deal of trouble this winter about the transportation problem. I am optimistic enough to believe we will be able to work out of the difficulty, but we have simply got to raise the money we need if we are to do it."
