

Tercentenary of Pilgrims' Arrival Begins Thursday

Local Celebrations to Start With Garden Party on Governors Island.

As the local beginning of the international celebration of the tercentenary of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers and the establishing of the first American legislative assembly, a garden party and military athletic meet will be held on Governors Island on next Thursday. The party will be under the auspices of the Sulgrave Institution and the Army Relief Society. The tercentenary will be celebrated on each side of the Atlantic at appropriate times in the course of the year. Sulgrave Institution takes its name from Sulgrave Manor, the home of George Washington's ancestors in England, of which it is the custodian.

When the party is in progress dirigibles and two flights of five airplanes each from Mitchell Field will go through evolutions. Athletes of the army who recently won their events in elimination contests in the Department of the East for the Olympic games will compete. There will be single and double tennis matches and a review of the post battalion. Mr. Alton B. Parker and others will speak. At night there will be a dance at Corbin Hall. About fifty boxes have been provided, the proceeds from the sale of which will go to the fund of the Army Relief Society, which provides for the families of soldiers who die in the service. More than fifty societies are cooperating with the Sulgrave Institution, including the Aero Club of America, the American Defense Society, the American Federation of Labor, the American Mayflower Council, the Society of Mayflower Descendants, the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society, the Army and Navy Club of America, the Colonial Dames of America, the General Society of Mayflower Descendants, the Descendants of Colonial Governors, the Huguenot Society of America, the Military Order of Foreign Wars, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Sons of the American Revolution, the United States Daughters of 1812 and the New York Historical Society.
