

TWO 'COL. HOUSES'
DEPART ON LINER

Presence of Double of Former
Wilson Confidant Creates
Stir on Lapland.

FAIRBANKS ALSO SAILS

Five Steamships Leave for
Various Old World Ports
With 6,000 Passengers.

Five big liners with about 6,000 passengers, including an unusually large number of tourists on business and pleasure bent, put to sea yesterday for English, French and Belgian ports.

The honor of being the star passenger, which means the most gazed at by the waving of crowds, was shared by Col. R. M. House on the Lapland with a young couple known to the passenger list as Douglas Fairbanks and Mrs. Mary Pickford.

Col. House created a sensation by appearing in two different parts of the ship at one and the same time. There was much animated discussion of this eccentricity of behavior when it was discovered that the Colonel had a double on board in the shape of John T. Vance, a New York hotel owner.

The voyagers had the top of the strange experience before them all the way down the river and into the bay until it was driven from their minds by an accidental flying boat, which came roaring around the steamship off Sandy Hook. After coming about the big liner, the flying boat descended and glided over the liner just long enough to drop on board two dozen American seafarers for Mrs. Mary Pickford's party.

House in Good Mood

Col. House was in good mood and inclined that day, according to those who said that he had had to do with the improvement of friendly relations between this country and the Entente nations.

"When I returned here late last fall I was very ill," he said. "Now that I have recovered I am going to England and France, as was my usual custom before the war. I shall probably be gone all summer."

Asked if he did not feel a bit lonely leaving just before the Democratic convention, he admitted being a bit reluctant to go, but said he felt he needed the vacation. Asked if he had a "favorite room" in mind for himself, he smiled and said:

"I won't discuss politics."
P. A. Franklin, president of the International Mercantile Marine, called on the Lapland, with Mrs. Franklin, on what he described as a routine business trip. He will look into the Hamburg business of the company. He said he knew no more about the sale of the Lapland than had been published in the papers.

The first group of American delegates to the International Zionist Congress, which meets in London July 4, also sailed. In the party were Justice Louis D. Brandeis of the United States Supreme Court, Judge Julian W. Mack, Nathan Straus, Mrs. Mary Pea, Jacob De Haas, Louis Lipsky, Prof. Felix Frankfurter, Capt. Abraham Talin and David Rosenblum.

Herbert M. Johnson, executive director of the Chicago Opera Company, who also sailed, was enthusiastic concerning the acquisition of the Manhattan Opera House as the future home here of the Chicago company. Others who sailed on the Lapland were Lieut.-Col. Sir William Wiseman, representative here during the war of the British Treasury; Dr. Simon Plesner of the Rockefeller Institute; Sir Herbert Robinson Roswell, vice-president of the British Federation of Shipping Industries; and Sir Westcott Abell.

Bishop Gallor Sails

Bishop Thomas P. Gallor, president of the Council of the Episcopal Church, sailed on the American liner Philadelphia to attend the Lambeth conference in Lambeth palace, London. With him went Bishop Henry J. Mitchell of Atlanta, Bishop John McKim of Tokyo and Dr. William E. Gardner, head of the department of religious education of the church.

Sixteen men of the Princeton University track team also sailed on the Philadelphia to compete with Oxford University. They were headed by Richard Polson Cleveland, son of the late President. Others aboard were Col. E. E. Dwyer of Pittsburgh and Lieut.-Col. G. R. Fleming of London.

Two French liners, La Touraine and the Rochambeau, also sailed yesterday on La Touraine was Dr. J. Edouard Bohn of Bombay University, a fellow of the Royal Medical Society of London and a vegetarian for the last twenty-two years. He expressed the opinion that most of the freshly killed and canned goods were dangerous.

Madeline Pagot, the seventeen-year-old French girl who drank a bottle of ink at the Ellis Island immigration station when she was not permitted to land to marry her American sweetheart, was deported on the Rochambeau. The girl must go to France to have her passport visa and then will be permitted to land here.

Seven hundred Czechs-Slovaks also sailed on the Rochambeau, carrying with them a huge Liberty bell which they believe will have much the same significance in history as the Philadelphia relic. It will be presented to President Masaryk in commemoration of the formation of the new republic.

Others sailing were Scott Nearing, the radical, and his wife and two sons, and Frank T. Pope, dramatic editor of the Journal of Commerce.

On the Cunard liner Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, which carried 1,275 passengers, were George Arliss with Mrs. Arliss, the Countess d'Armedoy, Bishop and Mrs. F. F. Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. George B. Post and Carl J. Schmidlapp, vice-president of the Chase National Bank.

Mexico Keeps Rebels' Property

MEXICO CITY, June 11.—Property of the late Gen. Victoriano Huerta, formerly President of Mexico, and his family and of Gen. Felix Diaz, Francisco Villa, J. M. Maytorena and Eugenio Parades, revolutionary chieftains, has been exempted from the order relative to the restitution of confiscated property issued by the Government yesterday.

This sum is to complete an endowment of \$1,500,000 which the institution has been trying to raise among its friends and alumni and become effective when the fund is subscribed.
