

**BRONX MAN SEIZED  
IN JURY BRIBE CASE**

**Arrest Follows Conviction of  
Dr. Hammer for Causing  
Woman's Death.**

**OFFER QUOTED AT \$1,000**

**Borough Physicians Protest  
Verdict as Being Menace to  
Medical Profession.**

An investigation begun last Wednesday, when one of the jurors in the trial of Dr. Julius Hammer, since convicted of manslaughter in connection with an operation that caused the death of one of his women patients, told Judge Gibbs, in the Bronx County Court, that he had been offered \$1,000 on the condition that he would "do the right thing," resulted last night in the arrest of Thomas Sheehan of 74 East 173rd street. Sheehan was locked up, the charge against him being that he attempted to bribe a juror, Joseph Maher of 160 Forest avenue, The Bronx, the juror who declared he had been approached by a friend of the physician, told Judge Gibbs that the man who spoke to him mentioned other cases of a similar nature and said it would be profitable to sit on those juries. The investigation has not been completed yet it was said last night. Sheehan told the police he is employed by Gene Bennett, former Bronx cabaret owner, but now an operator on the New York Curb Market.

When the attempt to bribe the juror was made, it was said last night. The jury was completed, and the taking of testimony was begun on June 16. The case was being continued Wednesday morning when Maher spoke to Judge Gibbs. The judge immediately called a conference in his chambers, those attending including Dr. Hammer's counsel, John Kaddell and Attorney W. Cahane, who had been retained to conduct the defense, and Herbert Smith, District Attorney Francis Martin and his assistants also were there. After the conference the trial was adjourned and the investigation was started. The trial was continued Thursday and Friday, and Friday night the doctor was found guilty.

Curtis, his uniform clinging to him, ran back into the surf and with the assistance of a life guard and Edward Lundenbaum of 23 West Seventy-first street, Manhattan, brought out two other girls who were being carried out beyond their depth. They were Dorothy Smith, 14 years old, and Doris Sharp, 12. The Montague girl said the three had come to the beach for the day in Lundenbaum's car. They returned in his machine to their homes in Forest Hills. The rescues were the first of the beach season at Long Beach.

YOUNG WOMAN FAILS**

**Dr. Mutter Told How He  
Can Provide for Her.**

Surrogate Cahalan declined yesterday to sanction the adoption of Miss Leonora Rasmussen, 27 years of age, by Dr. Alder C. Mutter of 114 West Seventy-first street. "The petitioner wishes to provide for her welfare in every possible and suitable way, and to make suitable provision for her future," said the Surrogate. "The law still permits the making of wills and the creation of trusts." In his petition Dr. Mutter stated that his wife had divorced him in New Jersey, and is living with a married daughter, Mrs. Louis Meckle, in Elizabeth, N. J. Miss Rasmussen was born in Norway and, with a brother, has been in the employ of the physician for five years. Dr. Mutter informed the Surrogate that he greatly appreciates the aid and comfort Miss Rasmussen has been to him, that he has come to look upon her as his daughter, and that he desires to make her his legally adopted daughter to assure her future.
