

Washburn Triumphs Over Throckmorton in Nassau Tennis Final--Gofers Strong Links in Holiday Play

WASHBURN VICTOR IN TENNIS FINAL Defeats Harold A. Throckmorton in Spectacular Match at Nassau.

Watson M. Washburn stoned for his mediocre tennis in the metropolitan championship recently by winning the final round of the Nassau Country Club invitation tournament at Glen Cove yesterday.

Having beaten both Voshell and Mather by a forceful net attack, Throckmorton adopted the same tactics against Washburn and with the aid of the latter's tardiness in finding his match with Washburn, but the latter checked him suddenly in the second set and turned the tables on his opponent by superior maneuvering, crafter playing and better control.

Without exerting himself half as much as Throckmorton, Washburn had his man running all over the court, so superior was his placing. The steadiness and accuracy of Washburn's strokes proved too much for Throckmorton in the second and third sets and he trailed all the way.

In the doubles last in the afternoon Washburn triumphed again, this time with the aid of Dean Mather. They were extended to the limit of five sets to defeat Ichihy Kumagai and Harold A. Throckmorton in the cup round, coming from behind at 1-3, 2-1, 3-1, 2-1, 5-1.
