

AMERICANS HELD IN MEXICO DOPE RAIDS

Sonora Vice Crusade Now Aimed at All Sorts of Excesses.

MAY MAKE STATES DRY

Hard Liquor Will Be Poured in Gutters, Threat of the Governor.

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, July 10.—Following orders yesterday from the Governor of Sonora ordering a crusade against vice of all sorts and subsequent closing of open saloons and gambling houses last night officials to-day began raiding opium dives, arresting several Americans, Mexicans and Chinese.

Several hundred dollars worth of opium was confiscated in one establishment, which Government officials declare to have been the largest resort of its kind in Mexico.

no definite orders had been received, he believed saloonkeepers would be given an opportunity to destroy or ship out of the State all forbidden liquors. After a certain time, he said, orders were expected from the Governor of Sonora authorizing Federal troops to confiscate and pour into the gutters all hard liquors. illicit stills, which in the past have not been bothered except for Federal taxation, will be unsharpened and the cutters chopped into bits with axes, he declared.

VILLA THREATENS TERROR IF REBUFFED

Sends Word Rejection of Terms Means Trouble.

EL PASO, Texas, July 10.—Francisco Villa, the Mexican bandit and revolutionist, sent word to the border to-day by one of his agents that rejection of his terms by the new Government would cause him to start a new reign of terror in northern Mexico. Villa, it was said, has discontinued his operations until July 15 as the result of an armistice arranged in negotiations last week.

The agent said Villa had received renewed pledges of support from other revolutionists who were against the Carranza Government and now are either actively at war or planning campaigns against the De la Huerta regime. All of these leaders were declared opposed to the 1917 Constitution, and will seek to have a government set up in Mexico that will restore the Constitution of 1857.

An American returning to the border from a trip through Mexico said to-day there is a wide undercurrent of dissatisfaction in Mexico, and that former Mexican Federal officers ousted by the new regime are creating dissension. Southern Mexico leaders, he said, are particularly bitter because they declare most of the Government agencies have been filled by Sonorans.

Mexico City itself, he said, is filled with 12,000 soldiers, principally Yaqui and Mayo Indians, who were taken there by Gen. P. Elias Calles, Minister of War and Marine, and these have supplanted all other soldiers in the capital, whether Federal or troops of other leaders in the recent revolution.

ARREST SCHEDULED IN ELWELL TANGLE

'Prominent Business Man' Accused in 'Bootlegging' Transaction With Turfman.

'BEATRICE' ENTERS CASE

Dooling Hears She Visited Murdered Man at Miami Early in Spring.

The arrest of a prominent business man in connection with "bootlegging" transactions in which associates of the slain Joseph Elwell were involved is scheduled for to-morrow morning. Announcement to this effect was made yesterday by August Hasenflug, counsel to James S. Shevlin, supervising prohibition enforcement agent for this district, following a conference with Assistant United States Attorney Albert C. Rothwell. Mr. Hasenflug stated that the business man will be arraigned in the Federal Court to-morrow morning to plead to a warrant charging him with violation of the Volstead law through the receipt of "bootleg" liquor from William E. Barnes, who was Elwell's secretary and confidential agent.

Barnes appeared at Mr. Rothwell's office for questioning. He was accompanied by his attorney, John J. Kuhn of the firm of Oland & Kuhn of 115 Broadway, on whose advice he refused to answer a number of questions.

"Tony" Central Figure. Most of these queries related to the man who has been mentioned in connection with the "bootlegging" transactions as "Tony," and who is being sought by the Federal authorities as the possible key to the mystery surrounding Elwell's connection with a "whiskey ring." Barnes evinced a desire to shield "Tony," and the conference was terminated within ten minutes. Mr. Kuhn obtaining a postponement until Tuesday morning.

In talking to reporters Barnes assumed an injured air. "I'm always on hand when they want to question me," he said. "I've done all that I could to help them clear up that affair on West Seventieth street. I've told them everything that I know about it, and I'm sure I can't possibly do any more." By "the affair on West Seventieth street," he meant the mysterious murder of his former employer at 244 West Seventieth street in the early morning of June 11. Although this tragedy occurred exactly one month ago to-day, this prospect of the arrest of a business man on a "bootlegging" charge appears on the surface to be the only tangible result of the innumerable investigations that started in the offices of both State and Federal authorities.

It is admitted that the inquiry into Elwell's bootlegging transactions, while it is providing some sensational developments, does not seem to point toward a solution of the murder mystery. The only chance of a capture of the murderer resulting from these "bootlegging" disclosures lies in the fact that some of several persons said to have been treated with Elwell in the clandestine sale of liquors may have had a motive for killing him and that a probe of the matter may bring the name of this person to light.

Assistant District Attorney John T. Dooling, who was in charge of the prosecutor's office yesterday in the absence of Mr. Swann, devoted his time to an entirely different angle of the case.

"Beatrice" Enters Case. Mr. Dooling, who has stated that he intends to take no rest until the slayer of the turfman is brought to justice, questioned an official of the United States Mortgage and Trust Company and several other persons about the bank deposits and withdrawals of Mrs. Amelia Hardy, sister of the Countess Sonia Szaniewska, who was one of Elwell's intimate friends, but who claims that she saw nothing of him for a long period of time preceding his death.

Mr. Dooling explained that he is making similar inquiries about the bank accounts of various other women with whom Elwell was acquainted. Mrs. Hardy is said to have given full permission for this checking up on her accounts.

"Beatrice," and is said to be a former war nurse, a would-be actress and a baseball fan.

Mr. Dooling was told that "Beatrice" knew several members of the New York American League baseball team, and that she visited the "Tankers" training camp early in the spring.

While there she heard that Elwell was at Miami, not far distant, and she hurried thence. She is said to have told a sporting man that Elwell had promised to send her to Europe this summer.

The rumor persisted yesterday that certain detectives from the police homicide squad, acting under direction of Captain Carey and cooperating with the District Attorney's office, have made some very important discoveries which are being kept secret, and that they hope for an early arrest of the murderer. Official information on this point, however, was refused. Mr. Dooling reiterated his statement of Friday that he is confident the mystery will be solved.

ORIZABA MAKES QUICK TRIP.

Here From Havana, 1,185 Miles. In 61 Hours, 50 Minutes.

A new record was established yesterday for passenger liners when the Ward liner Orizaba arrived in port after covering the 1,185 miles from Havana in 61 hours and 50 minutes.

The liner was delayed in the Cuban port for a week on account of strikes and harbor congestion, but hit up a fast pace when once she got to sea. She carried 112 first and 541 second class passengers, including many Spanish farmers, who came all the way from Spain on the liner and are bound for the western part of this country, where farm hands command high wages. The Orizaba made the voyage from Spain to Cuba in nine days.

INJUNCTION IS DENIED.

Manhattan Beach Residents Get Setback in Their Fight.

Residents of Manhattan Beach who are fighting to secure the right to use certain of the beachfront for bathing purposes and for the privilege of unrestricted pedestrian communication between Manhattan and Brighton Beaches received a setback yesterday. Justice Squires, in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, refused to grant a temporary injunction to Nathan Schwarzstein and

his wife, Augusta, restraining the Brighton Beach Park, Inc., the Macaday Building Corporation and the Manhattan Beach Development Company from erecting an obstruction cutting them off from access to the beach.


ASKS \$15,000 FOR DOPE DEATH.

Mrs. Yundel Asserts Her Son Got Metal Polish for Whiskey.

Mrs. Mary Yundel, mother of Samuel Yundel and administrator of his estate, filed suit for \$15,000 in Newark yesterday against John and Luke Boylan, proprietors of a saloon at 213 Bank street, Newark, where Yundel died October 5, 1918, after taking a drink of what was supposed to be whiskey. Mrs. Yundel alleges negligence on the part of the saloon keeper.

An autopsy revealed that the liquid served Yundel was metal polish containing poison. The bottle had been left on the bar beside a whiskey bottle, Joseph Yundel of Jenner, Pa., who had a drink at the same time, died three days later.
