

**P.P.C. Printing Facts**

A job press is one used for printing a small sheet—about 14 x 20 inches. A cylinder press gets its name from the fact that it has a cylindrical tympanum, but it prints from flat plates. Altho the Kelly Press is usually found in the job department, it is really a very rapid, small size, automatically fed cylinder press, printing a sheet up to 17 x 22 inches. Rotary presses print from curved plates and are very speedy. They generally feed the paper from a roll, and are then called web presses. Some rotary presses, however, are sheet-fed; these are slower than the web presses.

**IRISH TOWN SACKED AFTER TWO KILLINGS**

**Buildings Burned and Promiscuous Shooting Goes On in Tuam.**

**\$500,000 DAMAGE IS DONE**

**Police and Military Said to Have Been Active in Work of Destruction.**

TUAM, County Galway, Ireland, July 20.—There was promiscuous shooting and several buildings were burned, including the town hall, in an outbreak here early this morning resulting from the killing of two policemen near Tuam last evening.

The firing began at 5 o'clock, arousing the inhabitants and driving them to shelter. Later fires were started in different parts of the town doing \$100,000 damage, according to the Press Association. The military forces were called out, but were soon withdrawn.

The policemen killed were Constables Carey and Burke. They were shot dead when returning from the Galway Assizes by a party of from forty to fifty armed men, who blocked the road with felled trees and waited in ambush until the car in which Carey and Burke, a sergeant and another constable were riding came in sight. Observing the obstruction, Carey and Burke jumped out of the car and were shot and killed instantly. The two others alighted and fired upon their assailants until their ammunition was expended. They were then overpowered and relieved of their rifles, blindfolded and ordered to return to Tuam.

The police and military became active shortly afterward, and it is alleged they sacked the town, shots being fired into houses and shops. Buildings were set afire and the town hall was wrecked.

DUBLIN, July 20.—The official report of the rioting at Tuam received at Dublin Castle says that after the murder of Burke and Carey a party of police and military went to Tuam. The police got out of hand on seeing the bodies of their dead comrades. Shots were fired and houses burned. The police allege that they were fired upon.

Eleven members of the Royal Irish Constabulary were shot dead between July 11 and 19, and with the burning of the third court house in North Dublin has been burned within a week.

No Dublin metropolitan policeman has been killed since April 20, the men of this force now being unarmed while on duty.

**ACCUSED OF PLAN TO SLAUGHTER IRISH**

**Assassination of Commissioner Smyth is Explained.**

When Commissioner Smyth of the Irish Constabulary was assassinated by unknown men who broke into a Belfast club where he was sitting with friends it was recalled that some weeks previous he had advised a detachment of constabulary at Listowel to shoot down all Sinn Feiners who would not surrender. The constables promptly tendered their resignations to the Chief Inspector. A letter written by Jeremiah Neely, one of the constables, and attested by eight of his comrades, gives the men's version of the incident. It was made public in New York last night from sources close to Sinn Fein, and reads in part:

"On Thursday, June 17, an order from our authorities told us that by 12 noon next day (Friday) the military were to be in possession of the Listowel police barracks. All the police were to be transferred to the different stations in Listowel district. Saturday morning two motor cars pulled up at Listowel police barracks having, among others, Mr. Smyth, Divisional Commissioner for Munster. We assembled in the day room and Mr. Smyth addressed us as follows:

"Well, men, I have something of interest to tell you, something that I am sure you would not wish your wives to hear. I am going to lay all my cards on the table. I may reserve one card to myself. Now, men, Sinn Fein has had all the sport up to the present; we are going to have the sport now. The police have done splendid work considering the odds against them. The police are not in sufficient strength to do anything but hold their barracks. This is not enough, for as long as we remain on the de-

MEXICO CITY, July 20.—Gen. Pablo Gonzalez, former candidate for the Presidency, charged with being the leader of the abortive revolution in the State of Nuevo Leon, has been unconditionally set free by order of Gen. Calles, the War Minister, as no longer constituting a peril to the administration, according to an official announcement.

The text of the order for Gen. Gonzalez's release says:

"Referring to your (Gen. Treviño's) message that the court martial had declared Pablo Gonzalez guilty of inciting to rebellion: Since the Government considers itself sufficiently strong, being supported by public opinion with regard to the integrity of its proceedings, and does not fear that Gonzalez will continue to agitate the stability of its administration, you will therefore set him absolutely at liberty. The Nation already has pronounced its inexorable judgment on this matter."

Alfredo Robles Dominguez, a one-time personal representative in the United States of the late President Carranza, was nominated Presidential candidate by the National Republican Convention. He received 210 votes against a combined vote of 31 for his opponents. Gen. Obregon and Gen. Manuel Pelaez, Military Governor of Tamaulipas, were among those whose names were proposed to the convention as possible candidates for the Presidency.

If elected, Senor Dominguez will be pledged to call a convention to promulgate a new constitution. The Republican party chiefly represents the Catholic element.

**ANNUNZIO'S BOMBS WAIT FOR LEAGUERS**

**Doubts the Supreme Council's Fiume Intentions.**

PARIS, July 20.—In an interview published here to-day Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio shows an interesting lack of confidence in the good faith of the Supreme Council in its Fiume proposals. He says: "I propose to make Fiume a free port, open to Jugo-Slavs, Hungarians, Czechs, Slovaks, Germans and Austrians. What more can they want? They talk about a free State of Fiume. I have no objections, if they really give freedom to her, coupled with assurances of territorial contiguity with Italy and the creation of Italian markets here."

"But if the good fellows of the League of Nations intend to dominate this free State—if they even dare to come here—they know what their reception will be. They will be met with hand grenades and bombs. That will be enough."

The poet-patriot intends to maintain the Italian claim to Dalmatia even should the Giolitti Government have other plans. "Giolitti does not seem to have the same animosity that Nitti had," he said, "but it is said that he intends to renounce Italian claims to Valona. I will have to occupy Valona immediately if he does so."

**PALESTINE SETTLERS MUST TILL OWN LAND**

**Only Bona Fide Agriculturists to Be Allowed Farms.**

LONDON, July 20.—The Jewish Socialists won a victory in the Zionist Conference to-day, when, after three hours of tumultuous debate, they forced the adoption of an amendment to the report of the colonization commission, the amendment declaring that all settlers in Palestine, with or without capital, must cultivate their lands themselves.

The colonization programme provides that only Jews who are working successfully as farmers "in call" shall be assisted to settle on land, and that those who have only theoretical agricultural knowledge must gain adequate working knowledge in Palestine before settling there.

The programme proposes that large areas be purchased and improved for Jewish farmers by the Zionist organization operating through a commission of experts, whose business it would be to see that there is an intensive exploitation of the country. All public works must be carried out with a view to public utility and national economy.

The land programme adopted yesterday provides that the resources of the Zionists be placed, in the first instance, at the service of such settlers as have undertaken to comply with the principles of the Jewish National Fund, and in order to give full dominion to its position it is authorized to invest the whole of its resources, without restrictions, in Palestine land purchase to be centralized in an officially recognized institution under Zionist control.

To permit the rapid possession of Palestine lands, the National Fund shall devise means whereby private capital can be utilized for the purchase of land under conditions which will "assure the subsequent transference of such lands into national possession."

**GREEKS FIGHT TURKS NEAR ADRIANOPLE**

**Orient Express Held Up on Way to Constantinople.**

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.—Greek officials say they have not yet started the movement into Oriental Thrace. There are unverified rumors that the Greeks are having clashes with the Bulgarians.

No explanation has yet been made by the Greeks as to their reason for firing recently on a French airplane on its way from Constantinople to Bucharest. Railway traffic has been interrupted by the fighting between the Greeks and Turks in the region of Adrianople. The Orient Express on its way to Paris was held up here, while an express train in the same service on its way from Paris and due here to-night, has been held up east of Adrianople.

**U. S. MAY RECOGNIZE MEXICAN REGIME**

**Recent Uprisings Reported as Efforts to Defer It.**

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Advantage is to be taken of the coming Presidential campaign to obtain if possible recognition by the American Government of the de facto Government of Mexico, Don Fernando Icaño Calderon, the Mexican Ambassador, and Justice Gonzalez of the Mexican Supreme Court, are both here working for the coveted recognition.

**INDIAN TROOPS SENT TO MESOPOTAMIA**

**British Order Reinforcements to Cope With Arabs.**

LONDON, July 20.—Large reinforcements for the British troops have been ordered from India to Mesopotamia to cope with the Arab revolt there, it was announced in the House of Commons to-day by Winston Churchill, the Secretary of War.

Mr. Churchill said there was no reason for anxiety regarding the position. He said the approximate British casualties in the present Arab revolt are three British and Indian officers killed and fourteen wounded, 158 Indian troops killed or missing and 232 wounded. He added that the garrison in Rumetia is holding out against the Arabs, obtaining supplies by airplane and by raiding the town of Rumetia, which has been effectively bombed by British airplanes. The rebellion has spread to the Shamiyah district.
