

### ROOT FINDS FRANCE DISAPPOINTED IN U.S.

Unable to Understand Why Wilson Declines to Enter European Parleys.

### TO STAY THREE WEEKS

Informal Talks With Paris Statesmen Follow Work on World Court.

PARIS, July 31.—Elihu Root, whose visit to Paris has been eagerly awaited by many French statesmen, is now at the Hotel de Crillon, the birthplace of the League of Nations covenant, where he will remain for three weeks. While Mr. Root intends to have informal talks with many leading Frenchmen he will not make any public utterances and it is probable that he, pursuing the same policy he did in England, will not permit any political interpretation to be put on his visit here because of the work in connection with the court of justice of the league.

Mr. Root, in common with other American visitors, has found that disappointment over the present American policy of total aloofness in all European conferences is much keener among the French than among the British. Republicans like Myron T. Herrick, one time American Ambassador to France, and Mr. Root have pointed out to friends, however, that the present policy is entirely President Wilson's and apparently is designed as an argument for the Wilson league policies. It is the opinion of some of those visiting the Republican leaders here that the United States might with propriety participate in these discussions without committing itself to the league issue.

### TO BAN SUNDAY WORK ON FRENCH PAPERS

Writers and Printers Must Take Weekly Rest Day.

The project is backed by many editors and members of the Chamber of Deputies, including Leon Daudet, Jean Lefebvre, Pierre Dignac and Dr. Oberkirch, and is understood to have gained support in the committees and the majorities of all political factions.

### ARMENIAN TASK ENDS, HOOVER TELLS COLBY

Food and Supplies Sent by U. S. Worth \$21,000,000.

Following the resignation of Col. William N. Haskell, U. S. A., as High Commissioner to Armenia, Herbert Hoover yesterday wrote to L. A. B. Colby, Secretary of State, requesting that the State Department notify the Council of Ambassadors of the resignation of Col. Haskell. Mr. Hoover also notified Secretary Colby that with the resignation of Col. Haskell his own services in connection with this branch of European relief would come to an end.
