HYLAN WANTS 'CITY'S SHARE'

Mayor Hylan submitted to the Board of Estimate yesterday a request for the establishment of a new department, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of checking up on the capital investment and revenues of the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company and the Empire Subway Company, Ltd. which control respectively the installation and maintenance of the high tension and low tension electrical conductors for the subways, telephones and other electrical services.

CUSTOMS EMPLOYEES TO GET INCREASES

1,800 at This Port Jumped \$200 to \$600. Increases in the salaries of 1,800 employees under Byron R. Newton, Collector of the Port, have been granted by Washington, Mr. Newton announced yesterday after a visit to the capital. The wage increases, which will be of from \$20 to \$60 a year, will take effect as of July 1, the beginning of the fiscal year, Mr. Newton announced. The men of the customs service, it is said, have been so underpaid that many were leaving the service. Laborers will not receive an increase because their wages are fixed by law.

LARGE SHOP DEFIES STRIKING FURRIERS

Balch, Price & Co. Go on Open Shop Basis. Defiance of the furriers' unions now on strike yesterday by Balch, Price & Co., prominent Brooklyn outfitters and one of the largest fur manufacturing concerns in New York city. In a statement declaring it would be impossible to keep their shops open under the demands of the strikers to cut down the hours of labor so that more men might find employment, and granting to the unions the right to hire and fire men, Theodore Schneider, vice-president and general manager of the Brooklyn concern, announced that they have been operating their factories since Tuesday on the open shop principle.

STIFF PRISON TERMS GIVEN ARMY BANDITS

Two Soldiers Had Confessed to Robbing Benefactor. Two regular army soldiers were sentenced yesterday by County Judge Cleary at Somerville, N. J., for holding up Henry S. Wright, son of the Postmaster at Liberty Corners, during the commencement day celebration at West Point last June. Harry Leon was sentenced to from five to fifteen years in the penitentiary and Russell to from three to fifteen years. Both had entered pleas of guilty.

STREET CAR IN CRASH, POLICEMAN IS HURT

Truck Wrecked; Driver Held for Recklessness. Patrolman Edward Schmidt of the East 194th street station was standing beside the motorman on a Port George bound Third Avenue car last night on the way to the station house for reserve duty. Between 10:30 and 10:40 streets a big motor truck driven by Harry Swinman, 418 Oak street, New Haven, Conn., attempted to cut in front of the car. The car struck it, crushing the truck against an elevated pillar and also smashing the front platform of the street car.

NEW YORK SUFFERS SHORTAGE OF COAL

Extension of Priority Urged for Public Utilities. Alfred M. Barrett, acting Public Service Commissioner, telegraphed yesterday to the Interstate Commerce Commission that the shortage of coal for public utilities is so acute here that an extension of the commission's order giving priority of coal for utilities is absolutely essential.

STAGE STAR SUES, ACCUSING HUSBAND

Charlotte Greenwood Says Ring Was Unfaithful. Charlotte Greenwood, musical comedy star, filed a summons and complaint in the Supreme Court yesterday in a suit for divorce against her husband, Cyril Ring. The suit is entered in the name of Mrs. F. C. C. Ring. The complaint alleges misconduct by Mr. Ring in Philadelphia.

REV. H. C. HERRING DROWNS IN SURF

Friend Risks Life to Save Secretary of Congregationalist Board. The Rev. Dr. Hubert Clinton Herring, secretary of the National Council of Congregational Churches of the United States, met his death suddenly yesterday afternoon while swimming off the south shore of Martha's Vineyard, according to word received here last night. A friend who was with him made efforts to rescue him, but failed. The clergyman's body drifted for an hour before it was recovered. As some doubt prevailed as to whether the death was caused by drowning or by a sudden heart attack, an autopsy was ordered.

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WOMAN IN ARENAS DRAMA GOES HOME

Ruth Jackson Promises Court to Forget Stage and Stick to Her Husband. "Ruth Jackson," the girl whose brief but lurid New York career culminated a week ago in the tragedy in which Dr. Jose Arenas, a Spanish-American dentist, committed suicide, snuffed assent yesterday when City Magistrate Joseph Schwab told her to abandon her dreams of a stage career and to stick henceforth to home and husband.
