

'CRANK' GIVES TRAIL TO KIDNAPPED BABY

Philadelphia Police Sent 3 Men Out in Automobile Following Confession.

BELIEVE CHILD IS SAFE

Rasquale Says Little Blakely Coughlin Was Taken by a Russian Pole.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 7.—Blakely Coughlin, the fifteen-month-old Norristown baby, was stolen by a Russian Pole, according to a purported confession made today by Augusto Pasquale, "the crank."

The baby, according to the same confession, was alive and well as recently as last Sunday night, when Pasquale said he escorted the woman who has the child in her custody to the Market street ferry, this city.

Following these disclosures, Director of Public Safety Cortelyou took a hand in the examination. Late this afternoon, after Director Cortelyou had completed his examination of the man, Police Capt. Souder sent three men in a fast car on an errand which he hoped might end in the recovery of the baby. The men were sent after Capt. Souder had been called to the telephone. What the "tip" was he would not say.

Pasquale in his examination in Souder's office revealed many details of the kidnaping. He stopped, however, when he came to the point of telling where the baby is now hidden.

Tells of the Disclosures.

Capt. Souder and Major Adams, head of the State police, were undecided whether to believe Pasquale's story. They had prepared to put him through the "third degree" again today, aided by several other detectives of skill and experience. It turned out that the detectives listened more than they asked questions. Pasquale decided to confess, if his story is to be credited.

His decision to talk at length was made on the advice of Benjamin F. Goodman, an attorney. Mr. Goodman was present at the interview in Capt. Souder's office. For more than an hour Pasquale talked, and yet the extremely important disclosure he refused to make. He would not tell where the baby was hidden.

Mr. Goodman made the following statement concerning his talk with Pasquale:

"I was more than an hour with Pasquale this morning in the presence of Capt. Souder and, closely questioned Pasquale with the result that I am convinced Pasquale had nothing to do with the actual kidnaping."

"He said: 'I met a Russian Pole the night before the kidnaping on Seventh street. We were going to pull off a job together, but in some way I lost him. I did not meet him again until the day after the kidnaping.'

Saw Child Last Sunday.

"I asked him whether he got any money out of the job he was going to pull off and he replied that he had got no money but had got a millionaire's baby."

"A man had nothing to do with the kidnaping, but agreed to write the letters to Coughlin demanding ransom, because the Russian Pole could not write English. He wrote the letters and got a piece of change out of it."

"He further admits he is the man who bought the farm at New Gretna and placed the signal along the railroad track near Egg Harbor to obtain the \$10,000 demanded in the last 'Crank' letter."

"Pasquale told me he last saw the woman who has the baby at Market street ferry at 10:30 o'clock last Sunday night. Pasquale went with the Russian Pole to Egg Harbor, where he left him to go to New Gretna. Pasquale came back to Egg Harbor Monday morning to get the second haul when he was arrested. This Russian Pole told Pasquale that he had been discharged from the Holmeburg prison in February. He had served nine months for highway robbery."

Goodman says he is looking up the prison records to see if he can learn the identity of the Russian Pole, as Pasquale would not give his name.

BOY PLAYING WITH GUN KILLS MOTHER

Bullet Penetrates Brain of New Jersey Woman.

Mrs. Albert Tekary was killed instantly yesterday afternoon in the kitchen of her home in Sunnyside avenue, Bergenfield, N. J., when her son, Albert, 12 years old, accidentally discharged a pistol with which he was playing. The bullet entered over her left eye and penetrated the brain.

The boy, frightened by his act, ran from the house, while six other children, who were in the room at the time of the shooting, tried to revive their mother. Albert was captured, but without being told that the accident had resulted fatally and was locked up in the county jail at Hackensack, where he was temporarily committed to Justice E. T. McKay, pending investigation of the tragedy.

A Deputy Sheriff notified Mr. Tekary, who is employed in Manhattan by the American Express Company.

SHAMROCK CREW SAILS

Thirty on Philadelphia and Others to Depart in Week.

Thirty members of the crew of Shamrock IV, and her trial horse, the twenty-three meter Shamrock, sailed yesterday for home on the American liner Philadelphia.

Capt. Alfred Diaper, sailing master of the smaller ship, who came to the pier to see the men off, said he and others of the two crews would leave Saturday on the Red Star liner Kroonland.

Among the 575 passengers on the Philadelphia were Dr. and Mrs. N. L. Britton, Frederick Bancroft, Romulo Pasquale, Mexican Consul in Paris, and Dr. Simon I. Frantz, specialist in mental diseases, who went aboard on a mission for the Government.

LIQUOR ON SHIP IS SEIZED.

1,000 Cases of Whiskey and Gin Taken From Canadian Vessel.

OSDERSBURG, Aug. 7.—Provincial Revenue inspectors removed from the Montreal steamship Samuel Marshall today more than 1,000 cases of American and Canadian whiskey and gin, valued at between \$35,000 and \$40,000.

The vessel, seized by the Canadian officials last night at Cardinal, Ont., on a charge of violating the Canadian customs laws, was taken to Prescott, Ont. It was en route from Montreal to Lake Ontario ports when it was held up. The owners are arranging to furnish bond for its release.




