Spencer won the big "Dutchman" in two straight heats of a mile match. Moskops had a fall in warming up before the race started which might have affected him some, but still the consensus of opinion among the fans was that Spencer is the better man.

In the first heat Spencer beat around Moskops a lap and one half from home and was never headed. Moskops had a try going down the back stretch but would not get around Spencer and finished a length in the rear. The last eighth mile was ridden in 12 1/2 seconds.

Spencer waited until three quarters of a lap from the finish, the second heat, before he started. Moskops and then did it in a rather easy fashion, leading Moskops home by more than a length. The time for the last eighth mile in this heat was 12 seconds flat.

Alfred Grenda won the fifteen mile race. The pace was so hot that such stars as Kramer, Eaton and Moskops were forced to quit. Oscar Ziger finished second, beating Jake Magin, Alex Mott, Peter Decker, Lloyd Thomas and Peter Decker.
