

3 MORE STRIKES ORDERED IN DAY Plumbers, Painters and Van Drivers Vote to Quit for Increases. 20,000 ARE INVOLVED Men Employed in Mechanical Department of Federal Buildings Go Out.

Three more strikes, involving approximately 20,000 van drivers, plumbers and painters and their helpers, are to be added to-day or to-morrow to the already long list of New York's labor troubles. The Van Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Helpers and Packers Union voted unanimously last night to strike this morning. At the same time the Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers voted to leave their work to-morrow morning. The Plumbers and Helpers Union submitted demands to their employers yesterday afternoon and voted unanimously last night to strike this morning at 11 o'clock if they are not granted. In addition to these strikes firemen, engineers, oilers and other mechanical workers employed in the Federal buildings in Manhattan and Brooklyn left their jobs last night. The office of the Treasury Department had refused to put into effect the Macy Congressional wage award. These men, however, declare that, being government employees, they are not on strike. They have merely quit their jobs and will seek work under private concerns where they can obtain a living wage. This trouble will cripple the sewer and lighting service in the Custom House, the Post Office buildings and other Government structures. A similar condition was presented at Ellis Island when the men received an increase in wages which approximates the Macy award. The plumbers, painters and paper hangers held a meeting last night at the Yorkville Casino in East Eighty-sixth street and voted unanimously to strike unless the master painters and the independent employers agree to raise their wages to \$10 a day. The men already have a five day week and a eight hour day. The plumbers have small hope that their demands for shorter working hours and more money will be met by their employers until the strike has been called. In addition to these two principal demands, the plumbers also demand overtime at double the regular rate, ten holidays a year and other minor concessions.

troubles, and that now is the time to fight it out. This is accepted as one of the most critical times in the history of the Empire. Every newspaper here has been publishing public opinion behind the Government and there is not much doubt that, despite the action of the Triple Alliance in tonight, the bulk of the British public is against the strike.

VENA GOVERNMENT CRISIS

If the Government is not strong enough to face the music it will mean a demand for a new Government. It is expected, therefore, that despite the announcement to the contrary, Premier Lloyd George will return to London as soon as other labor bodies have acted on the strike question. While there is still a chance that the Trades Union Congress next Thursday may oppose the action of the Triple Alliance, it is not considered likely, in the face of the action by the three big unions. Even if the congress did oppose it, the action to-night means the shutting down of not only the coal mines, but also of all transport. While the Government has mobilized an emergency force of transport, as it did in the railroad strike last year, it is admitted that such arrangements are inadequate to maintain all industry, and with the shutting down of the iron and steel trades, as a result of the electricians' demands, the crisis could not be more serious. The action of the Triple Alliance came as a surprise in view of the danger of the surprise vote published earlier in the day. It showed 606,732 for a strike and 238,945 against, thus giving a majority of 367,817 for a strike, with 364,833 not voting.

BANK HEADS TELL OF PONZI AFFAIRS \$2,700,000 Was Largest Deposit in One Day.

Boston, Aug. 31.—The Federal reserves of Charles Ponzi, attempting to run down the assets of his broken business, to-day examined Henry A. Chmelinski and William S. McNary, president and treasurer, respectively, of the Hanover Trust Company, a bank which was closed when the Ponzi quick rich bubble was burst. It was testified by Treasurer McNary that Ponzi's maximum deposit for any one day was \$2,700,000 instead of the six or eight millions which Ponzi had claimed in public statements, while the run on his Securities Exchange Company was in progress. The bank paid out \$5,000,000 on Ponzi checks during this run. Mr. McNary said, Ponzi bringing in new money daily to meet the demands. The bank now has \$1,028,000 of his money in its vaults, for which the receivers hold a certificate of deposit, and the treasurer testified that he had attempted at one time to buy out control of the bank, but was stopped. Mr. McNary testified, by a vote that he was forced to withdraw his account of \$1,700,000 unless he ceased the attempt at control. The notes for \$25,000 each which Ponzi testified he held for money due him from the two bank officials were declared as obligations by each.

FRIDGER ATTEMPTS TO THWART LAWYER

Continued from First Page. private conference being held by the Public Service Commission and the various parties to the strike. This dispute began in the chamber where the hearings are conducted, and was revived later in the corridor and in Commissioner Barrett's office. Mr. Curley said the Mayor and the Corporation Counsel wanted him to attend all conferences, but that he did not like to have the door shut upon him. Mr. Barrett explained that it was necessary to hold certain private conferences for the purpose of obtaining satisfactory results. He said he knew perfectly well that the Corporation Counsel's office finds it necessary continually to do this same thing. The attorney, Commissioner Barrett of the result of a visit which he had paid during the morning at Judge Mayer's chambers. "I told Judge Mayer that I had received a message from either Shea or Mr. Fridger," he said. "When I got that far he put up his hand and said, 'Stop!'" He then explained that Judge Mayer had informed him that he did not care to receive any message from either Shea or Fridger, either directly or indirectly; that he considered the strike totally unjustified, and insisted that he would not deal with the carmen until they should return to work, and he would then deal with them only through some other committee than the one of which Shea and Fridger are members. He made his position clear, he said. Judge Mayer called a stenographer and dictated the letter which is printed elsewhere. This letter was read into the record against the objection of Fridger, Commissioner Barrett then briefly reviewed the existing situation, and said that he had reached certain conclusions which he had put into writing and would read into the record. Fridger protested, saying: "Are you going to reach a conclusion before you have heard both sides?" He called attention to the fact that he had been subpoenaed, but had not been called upon to testify at the hearings. He wanted to take the witness stand at once, but Commissioner Barrett ruled against him, saying: "We will give you a full opportunity to testify before these hearings are concluded."

BARRETT SUMS UP SITUATION

The Commissioner then read his conclusions, which were as follows: "With regard to the matter of settling the strike, I have no power to order either side to do anything. All that I can do is to recommend either or both sides to do certain things. The interest of the public in a matter of this kind is paramount. My sole purpose is to restore the service so that the public may not be inconvenienced. My recommendation is that those men who are now on strike return to work and perform their duties; that they appoint a committee to represent them, and that this committee wait upon the receiver and notify him of their grievances. "As I previously stated, I have no power to compel the receiver to do anything, but I feel that he is interested in serving the public and will do everything in his power to reach an amicable adjustment of these men and that he will believe that he will meet the men in a friendly spirit; that he will listen to reasonable demands and that he will act reasonably. "I, therefore, recommend that the receiver hear these men and that he grant them such relief, with the consent of the Court, as the circumstances of this case demand. In the event that the receiver and the committee are unable to agree, their differences will have to be settled in some way. "Arbitration is now looked upon as a most effective method of adjusting disputes. And in this connection I am inclined to believe that, irrespective of any agreement between the parties, if a situation arises in which the public is inconvenienced by lack of transportation facilities the superiority of those interests demands that the conflicting claims between railroad companies on the one hand and their employees on the other be settled. "Ordinarily arbitration is considered a fair way of adjusting disputes of this nature. But in this particular instance we have a rather peculiar situation. It is impossible for the receiver, without the consent of the court, to arbitrate the question of wages. The receiver is the representative of the court and must obey its instructions. In my opinion, it would be improper for the receiver to submit to arbitration a matter which might possibly exhaust all of the financial resources of the company, and that exception I think that all the other matters in controversy of which I am aware are arbitrable and that they should be settled by this method.
