POLAND PLEADS FOR STRATEGIC FRONT

Replying to American Warning, Points Out Peril of Fixed Line.

THANKS FOR NOTE OF U. S. State Department Pronounces Answer of Poles Entirely Satisfactory.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—Entire satisfaction was expressed to-day by State Department officials with the formal reply of the Polish government to the American note requesting a Polish declaration to abstain from transgression of Russian territory.

POLES GAIN GROUND ON ALL THE FRONTS
 Nearing the Niemen in North and Recover Galicia.

WARSAW, Aug. 31 (delayed).—Polish forces advancing toward Grodno have nearly reached the banks of the Niemen River, which flows past Grodno toward the north, according to reports from the northeastern front.

The greater part of eastern Galicia has been recovered by Polish and Ukrainian troops, who are masters of all the left bank of the Dniester River. Pursuit of the Bolshevik forces which appeared along the upper reaches of the Bug River near Sokol continues. In the region of Przemyśl, twenty-five miles southeast of Lemberg, the Poles have scattered Soviet forces that attempted to start an offensive operation. Gen. Pawlenko's Ukrainian column, which crossed the Dniester River south of the city of Bucacz, have developed their offensive successfully, obliging the Bolshevik west of the Sereth River to hurriedly retreat in order to avoid being surrounded.

POLAND ASKS TO MOVE ARMY EAST
 British Don't Like Savinkoff's Activities in Warsaw.

LONDON, Sept. 1.—The republic of Poland attacks all along the line in reported in the Russian Soviet official statement of Tuesday, received here to-day by wireless.

Polish forces have attacked Lithuanian troops near Augustowo, about thirty miles north of Grodno, according to a telegram from Kovno to the Lithuanian representative in London. Recent advice from Lithuania have referred to a boundary dispute between that country and Poland.

Poland is understood to have replied that strategic considerations must govern the halting of her armies in their pursuit of the Bolsheviks at the frontier line of Poland tentatively fixed by the Supreme Council. Suggestion had been made by the American Government in its note that Poland make clear that her intentions toward Russia were not imperialistic and that her armies should not advance beyond the ethnographic line laid down by the Supreme Council.

While insisting that the Polish Government is in entire accord with the United States in the contention that American territory should be respected, the note declares that Poland is forced to consider the serious consequences likely to ensue from the abandonment of the present offensive against the Bolshevik upon a fixed line without satisfactory guarantees.

Continued fighting in the region of Zamoac, forty-five miles southeast of Lublin, is reported in a Polish official communique. The northern wing of the Polish army is reported advancing without resistance. It has captured Grodek, taking more than 1,000 prisoners.

FRANCE TO SEND US \$100,000,000 GOLD
 Will Be Shipped as Soon as Loan Negotiations Are Ended.

PARIS, Sept. 1.—The willingness of American bankers to consent to a reduction in interest and in the underwriting commissions originally demanded in the negotiations in connection with the repayment of the Anglo-French loan has created a very favorable impression here.

The original demands of the bankers included a 10 per cent. interest provision besides an underwriting percentage, but it is understood here that M. Parmentier has effected a tentative reduction in the interest charges to something like 7 per cent., with a substantial cut in other demands, and even in the maturity terms.

British officials feel confident that it is only for strategic protection that the Poles wish to advance east of what has been declared by the Allies to be the ethnographic Polish line. There was one extremely disquieting element in the situation, however, in the apparent Polish cooperation with Boris Savinkoff, who was Minister of War under Alexander Kerensky and who was reported to be organizing a Democratic-Republican movement in Warsaw for the purpose of acting in conjunction with Gen. Baron Peter Wrangel in south Russia. The British have not abandoned the belief that peace must be made with the existing Russian Government, whatever that Government may be, and realize that patronage of Savinkoff is equivalent to interference in the internal affairs of Russia.

FIUME COLD TO POET.
 City Not Enthusiastic Over d'Annunzio's New State.
 LONDON, Sept. 1.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Rome quotes the Popolo Romano as saying Gabriele d'Annunzio has decided to abandon Fiume because of disappointment "at the cold reception" the inhabitants of Fiume gave to his proclamation of a constitution for the "Italian regency of Quarnaro," a new state which was to comprise the City of Fiume and several of the islands in the Adriatic Sea. The existence of the state was to be officially declared September 11, according to d'Annunzio.

Belgian Rulers Sail for Brazil.
 ZENEGGE, Belgium, Sept. 1.—The Brazilian battleship Sao Paulo sailed from here at 2 o'clock this afternoon with King Albert and Queen Elisabeth aboard. The King and Queen are to visit Brazil.

Tamayo Becomes President.
 GUAYAGUIL, Ecuador, Aug. 31.—Dr. Jose Luis Tamayo was inaugurated President of Ecuador in the presence of the diplomatic and consular corps and high civil and military authorities here to-day.
