

64 AMERICANS WIN COURSES AT OXFORD

Selections Announced for Scholarships Under Will of Cecil John Rhodes.

OLD QUOTA IS DOUBLED

Thirty-six States Get Two Each to Make Up for War Postponements.

Boston, Sept. 26.—Results of the annual election of Rhodes scholars to represent the United States at the University of Oxford were announced today by Prof. Frank Aydelotte of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, American secretary of the Rhodes trust.

The quota for the United States this year was, as last year, sixty-four, instead of the normal thirty-two, thus making up for the postponement of elections during the war.

The scholars elected for 1920 will go to Oxford in January, 1921, and those elected for 1921 will go in October of that year, to bring the appointments back to the regular schedule.

Next year the quota for the United States will be thirty-two, and two-thirds of the States will elect one man each, while those which this year made two appointments will have no election.

Rhodes scholars are chosen in accordance with a three-fold requirement in the will of Cecil John Rhodes, which compels character, intellectual ability and physical vigor.

No written examinations are held, the men being chosen on the basis of their school or college record, supplemented by a personal interview with the committee of selection.

NEW YORK WINNER GRADUATE OF CORNELL

Trowbridge Got Early Training in Flushing.

There was genuine surprise in the home of Alexander Duell Trowbridge at 73 Whitehouse avenue, Flushing, last night when a reporter for THE SUN and NEW YORK HERALD broke the news that Alexander Duell Trowbridge, Jr., has been chosen a Rhodes scholar from New York for 1920.

Trowbridge is 21 years old and was graduated from Cornell last June. He has just returned from spending the summer in Europe. While in college, Trowbridge was active in athletics, playing tennis, football and putting the shot. He did not win his letter. He was a member of Kappa Alpha fraternity and several honorary college societies.

During the war Trowbridge was in naval action, and at the signing of the armistice he was training at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The next contingent of Rhodes scholars is expected to leave in January, 1921. Trowbridge plans to specialize in economics during the war.

NEW YORK BIG FORCE AS LEGION GATHERS

Delegates Caucus on Reaching Cleveland and Vote Unit Rule.

By a Staff Correspondent of THE SUN and NEW YORK HERALD. CLEVELAND, Sept. 26.—New York State delegates to the second annual national convention of the American Legion, opening here to-morrow, will take a commanding lead in shaping the policies of the Legion during 1921.

At a caucus this morning the New York men and women decided to adopt the unit rule and to cast their total of seventy-eight votes in a block.

Wade H. Hayes, who was in command of the 10th Infantry and is now colonel of the Seventh Regiment of New York, was elected chairman of the delegation and floor leader.

In his hands will rest the appointment of New York committee members. Miss Ray C. Sawyer, "Bird of the Marines," is delegation secretary.

A "favorite son" boom for Hamilton Fish, Jr., of Garrison, for national commander, collapsed when the delegates announced that since Mr. Fish was running for Congress he would under the Legion constitution be ineligible for election to the Legion.

A fight is expected to be made upon the question of the constitution by those who assert that the Legion needs its own Congressmen and should endorse those of its members seeking political office.

There will be representatives from the various foreign veterans' associations, notably Gen. Marie Fayolle of France, representing Marshal Foch; Major Royal of the British army; and the British navy and Italian and Belgian delegates.

Representation for voting purposes will be based on the national census of August, which show a total paid up membership of \$18,680, of which New York State has 73,000.

Candidates for National Commander from the national caucus are: Milton J. Foreman of Chicago still leads in the hotel lobby league. Hanford MacNider of Mason City, Iowa, is looming large because of his war record and his open attack against the veterans.

John P. Herbert of Worcester, Mass., is another dark horse. He will be remembered as the man who influenced the St. Louis caucus of the Legion to declare that it would not meet in Chicago as long as Thompson was Mayor.

An unofficial canvass of the delegates reveals a ten to one sentiment in favor of the Federal Reserve Bank and the Fordney tariff plan of adjusted compensation will undoubtedly be endorsed.

Another plan suggested to aid former service men is a chain of legion stores designed to lower the cost of living for the veterans.

A demand will be made for the immediate publication of the slacker list. A reward will be offered for the capture of Grover C. Bergstrom, and the deposition of radicals will be demanded.

A popular visitor is Col. M. W. Wood of Boise, Idaho, who was born in 1846, in Watertown, N. Y., was wounded twice in the civil war and served in the recent war as surgeon.

NO GENERAL PRICE CUTS IN MATERIALS

Builders' Supplies Not Hit by Decreased Demand—Late Realty News.

Withering demand in an already over-sold market has so far had no general effect in building materials, according to compilations made by the Dow Service Daily Building Reports. Since August 1, when the slackening in new construction activity first began to be felt, price reductions have occurred in only ten items out of forty-two basic building commodities reported.

The remainder of the report shows no price change, while a few items, on the other hand, actually record price advances. The items sub-divided, according to price movements, covering decreased prices, except where noted, follow:
