

Several singular pieces of news were received in Wall street yesterday. Early in the morning it was reported that Gov. Ritner of Pennsylvania would visit the U. S. Bank till, as he had done once recently. No good foundation was, however, given for this rumor. The extraordinary fall of the stock in Philadelphia on Thursday of 3 to 24 per cent, indicated that some screw was loose. There is also a prodigious effort making by the administration forces to raise the cry of "bribery and corruption." We firmly believe, however, that Gov. Ritner will sign the bill.

In the afternoon private accounts were received from Havre by the Rhone, that the Message was satisfactory to France. This news spread pleasing intelligence all over town. Every body looked smiling, and stocks, which had fallen in the morning, picked up again. At the latest accounts, the public funds in London and Paris were quite heavy. The prospect of peace had caused the general markets on the continent to advance. At Liverpool cotton had advanced a little—at Havre colonial markets lively.

LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET, Jan. 7.—American Cotton has advanced during the week one farthing per lb. 30,000 bags have been sold during the past week including 500 to day. The imports to-day are five American, one Egyptian and four Brazil cargoes.

WASHINGTON MARKET, FEB. 12.

Except beef, the prices of provisions generally in this market is from 10 to 15 per cent lower than in Fulton market. Venison was selling this day at 12 1/2 cents a lb. in the former market, in the latter at 18 cents. The fine sleighing has enabled the farmers to bring in a plentiful supply of butter, some have come as far as 409 miles, and are selling this article at 6 cents a lb. less than is generally charged by the grocers. Eggs are also a fourth cheaper. Fire wood continues very high, Oak \$3.75 and Pine \$2.50 per load—Nut wood scarcely to be had. The prices of provisions in Fulton market, do not vary materially from our report of Thursday.
