LATEST INTELLIGENCE

Both Houses of Congress assembled at noon, to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of Senator Bristow. The coffin was placed in the area in front of the Secretary's desk, in the Senate chamber.

The President of the United States, the members of the cabinet, heads of bureaus, &c., assembled with the Senate. In the House of Representatives, after prayer by the Rev. Mr. Sprole, the reading of the journal was dispensed with.

Mr. Holmes moved to reconsider the vote of yesterday, by which the House agreed to adjourn to Saturday, in order to adjourn to Monday, but the motion was lost. The House then adjourned, and the members, preceded by the Speaker and the Sergeant-at-Arms, passed into the Senate chamber, where both Houses united in the funeral services.

The two Chaplains officiated. Prayer was offered up by the Rev. Mr. Sprole. The sermon and benediction were by the Rev. Mr. Slicer. At one o'clock the funeral procession moved from the capitol and proceeded to the Congressional burying ground, where the body was interred for the present.

Horrible Murder.—PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 31, 10 P. M.—The neighborhood of Foxville was thrown into great excitement this evening, in consequence of the murder of Mr. John Reese. The deceased was found near his own house, in the vicinity of the former town, having been, apparently, shot through the head with a pistol, and a pick-a-stewards driven through his skull.

The reason of the deceased is supposed to have been impaired, in consequence of having been tried about six months since for killing Thomas Calligan, but of which he was acquitted by the jury, on the ground of insupportable homicide. A more ghastly and shocking spectacle than was presented by the murdered remains, can scarcely be conceived. No clue had been discovered at last accounts, by which the murderer could be identified.

Death of Mr. Bristow.—Reconsideration of Mr. Baker's Resolution—Bill for Raising Ten Additional Regiments—The Pilot—The Two Millions Appropriation Bill.

Mr. Bristow's death, communicated through the telegraph this morning, has produced a lively sensation of grief throughout the city. His illness has been so brief that his friends are entirely unprepared for the shock of his decease. The Senate, in consequence of this sad intelligence, adjourned immediately after meeting. The House will adjourn to-morrow, and both branches of Congress will join in the melancholy ceremonial of the funeral obsequies.
