Movements of Parties, and the Next Presidential Election.

According to the appearance of things in Washington, the two old parties into which the country has been always divided, but whose distinctive marks and characteristics were temporarily lost sight of during the recent agitation on the slavery question, are assuming their ancient positions, and endeavoring to make capital for the Presidential election in 1852.

But for the passage of the compromise measures of the last session, the Union movement which was set on foot some time since, might have resulted in the formation of a great party composed of whig and democratic elements; but the reaction which took place in public opinion as soon as those measures were adopted, rendered as a Union party unnecessary, if it was seen there would be no disunionists of any great number or consequence to fight against, and that the ammunition would be thrown away in fighting with a shadow.

In this condition of things, therefore, the course which it was incumbent on those who direct the parties to pursue, was to dig away the rubbish which for a year or more past concealed the old party landmarks, to bring them again to the light of day, and to put them forward as dividing lines in the contest which will take place in 1852.
