The Senate of the United States was engaged yesterday, in active legislation upon several bills of paramount importance to the whole country.

The bill granting to Ohio the unsold and unappropriated lands in that State was engrossed by a vote of 26 to 18. There goes over two hundred thousand acres of the public domain. Land has been swept off at a wonderful rate by the present Congress.

Mr. Senator Bell, however, urges the necessity of arming our fortifications, and of building up a navy sufficient to meet this apprehended European invasion. Perhaps he is right, in view of the Presidential election. It may be convenient to give the administration as much patronage as possible, to meet the necessities of the campaign.

There is a surplus of thirteen or fourteen millions in the Treasury. Why should it lie idle, when ships and armies are wanted? But above all, in view of this apprehended war with Europe, it will be necessary to place at the head of affairs a man versed in the science of war, and fully able to meet the world in arms.
