THE STRAW SEWERS OF THE METROPOLIS.

Movement Among the Needle Women for Higher Wages.

ITS DEFT BY THEORISTS AND DR. MAGOUCZES.

THE PAST AND PRESENT CONDITION OF THE STRAW SEWERS.

The Causes of the Present Low Rate of Wages, &c., &c., &c.

We commence to-day, what we intended at the time of the publication of the account of the strikes among the trades—a history of the industrial classes of New York. In this history it is our purpose to give the condition of each trade in fact as it actually exists, without indulging in fancy sketches, which, whatever they may do, are certainly not calculated to effect any good.

The general movement took place among the needle women, and in fact among the female operatives throughout the city, in February and March of 1883. It commenced, we believe, among the straw sewers, and was occasioned by the attempts of some of the employers to reduce the prices which were paid at that time.
