AWARD OF PREMIUMS.

The twenty-sixth annual fair of the American Institute closed last night at ten o'clock. The attendance during its continuance was very small in comparison with former years, and the receipts were not sufficient to defray the expenses.

It is a pleasure to be able to announce that the fair, took no less than four hundred of its exhibitors from it. The premiums were awarded yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. Between one and two hundred persons assembled in front of the stage to hear them read. These were principally exhibitors, as was evident from their anxious and expectant looks.
