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THE REPLY OF THE CZAR TO AUSTRIA.

It was not till the 10th July, that the Russian Minister at Vienna communicated to the Austrian cabinet a despatch containing the answer of the Court of St. Petersburg to the demands of the German States, and some further delay appears to have intervened in consequence of the tardiness of the Emperor of Austria, which has been reported from his capital.

The Russian answer is said to have been communicated to the British and Prussian ministers at Vienna, and although the exact phraseology and the nature of this important document are still unknown to us, it is also no easy task to ascertain the extent of the concessions.
