The Hudson's Bay Company.

REPORT OF THE HUSBAN'S BAY COMPANY. The select committee of Parliament, appointed to consider the petition of the British possessors in the Hudson's Bay Company, have agreed to the following report:—

1. That there is one God, and He is a divine Trinity, called the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit; that these three are distinct and at the same time united in Him, as the soul, the body and the operation of the soul; and that the one God is the Lord Jesus Christ.

2. That saving faith is to believe in Him as the Redeemer, Regenerator and Saviour from sin.

3. That the sacred Scripture is divine truth; that it is to be taken as a whole, and that we may distinguish between good and evil, by which we may be delivered from the influence of evil spirits, and by which we may become associated with angels and conjoined with the Lord.

4. That we must abstain from doing evil, because it is of the devil and from the devil, and that we must do good, because it is of God and from God.

5. That in abstaining from evil and doing good we are to act as ourselves, but in the same time believe and acknowledge that the will, the understanding and the power to do so are of the Lord alone.

The Harvest of the World. From the London Economist, 1857. The harvest having been brought to a pretty general conclusion throughout England, it becomes necessary to consider its results, and its probable influence upon future prices, both here and in the other large grain producing countries of the world.

It is to be regretted that we have not been informed that the wheat crop is remarkably good, of unusually fine quality, and that the weight of the samples is fully up to 64 lbs. per bushel.

Notwithstanding these important facts, there are no signs of a glut in the market on the part of the growers in reference to price. They freely admit that their prospects are good, and that a very low range of value cannot be anticipated.

Even those who, at one time, were stern protesters against the ruin of the grain trade by the admission of foreign produce at a nominal duty, concede that value must rule comparatively high, allowing for present expectations, and that the position of the grain growers has been immensely benefited under the new system.

Although the general admission is that the new wheat is thrashing well, there is, we find, an effort made in some quarters to understate their actual produce, and it is frequently a matter of no little difficulty to get information upon this head, of a perfectly reliable character.

We have, therefore, made it a point to travel over the country, and to have our own eyes and ears, and to have the evidence they have received and the documents appended to their report.

Among the various objects of imperial policy which it is important to attain, your committee consider that the most important is to secure the reasonable wishes of Canada to be enabled to annex her territory south portion of the land in her neighborhood as may be available to her for the purpose of settling her population, and that she is willing to open and maintain communications, and for which she will provide the means of local administration.

Your committee apprehend that the districts which have never been settled, and which are likely to be settled in the future, are of great importance, and that the peace and good order of those districts should be effectually secured.

Your committee trust that there will be no difficulty in settling the territories which are now in the hands of the Hudson's Bay Company, by which these districts may be ceded to Canada on equitable principles; and within the districts thus annexed to her, the authority of the Hudson's Bay Company should be entirely ceased.

8. Your committee think it best to content themselves with indicating the outlines of such a scheme, leaving it to Her Majesty's government to consider the details, and to the House of Commons to give effect to the same.

9. In case, however, Canada should not be willing at a very early period to undertake the government of the territories which are now in the hands of the Hudson's Bay Company, your committee consider whether any temporary provision for its administration may not be advisable.

10. Your committee are of opinion that it will be proper to extend the British dominion in the Hudson's Bay Company with Vancouver's Island as soon as it can be conveniently done, as the best means of favoring the development of the great natural advantages of that important colony, and of securing to the British Empire the ultimate extension of the colony over any portion of the adjoining continent, to the west of the Rocky Mountains, on which permanent settlement is being made.
