WASHINGTON, July 2, 1861.

YANGON OF GENERAL PATTERSON'S DIVISION ACROSS THE POTOMAC.

Information was received here this morning, by special messenger, that about eighteen thousand Union troops, under General Patterson, were to cross the Potomac at Williamsport and Sheperdsburg, with the intention of encamping a few miles above Harper's Ferry.

The Harbinger Telegraph of to-day has the following: We learn from a gentleman who arrived from Esplanade, Md., that General Patterson moves his headquarters southward towards Harper's Ferry this morning, at about 6 o'clock.

The Second Maine regiment moved out this morning to a point a short distance beyond General Tyler's command at Fall's Church, arriving there at about four o'clock.

EXPEDITION DOWN THE POTOMAC RIVER.

Information was received from Alexandria this evening that an advance movement will be made from that point down the river towards Mount Vernon.

ABANDONMENT OF THE SIEGE OF FORT PICKENS.

A report has reached here this evening, brought by a gentleman from Richmond, to the effect that the rebels have raised the siege of Fort Pickens.

PASSAGE OF TROOPS INTO VIRGINIA.

The Fourteenth New York regiment passed over the Long Bridge early this afternoon, and are now encamped near Arlington House, on the Virginia side.

IMPORTANT MOVEMENT OF GEN. PATTERSON.

Passage of the Potomac by Gen. Patterson's Corps d'Armees—The Advance of the Troops Resisted by the Rebels—Sharp Action, and Hasty Retreat of the Enemy.

WASHINGTON, July 2, 1861.

The reporter of the press across the Potomac river, to see the expected movement of troops across the river at Sheperds' Ford, two miles below Washington.

The troops could not be seen with ease, and the crossing was abandoned.

General Negley's and Colonel Wynkoop's brigades actually struck their tents at three o'clock this morning.

In order to lessen the size of the column only five wagons, instead of eleven, are to be allowed to each regiment.

The Stars and Stripes were hoisted on a tree on the south side of the river to-day by a Marylander by the name of Senous.

Colonel Johnson lies at Roko's Run, three miles this side of Martinsburg, with about three thousand men.

The enemy were observed busily engaged in erecting earthworks immediately back of the heights opposite Doubleday's battery late this afternoon.

About fifty shots were exchanged this morning between the advance guards of the hostile forces at Sheperds' Ford.

There will doubtless be sharp work before the Fourth passes over, unless the rebels retreat.

HAGERSTOWN, Md., July 2, 1861.

At four o'clock this afternoon a special conveyance arrived in this town, bringing Corporal John N. McHenry, of the Independent Regiments; he being the first soldier brought here wounded in an action.

The morning was bright and beautiful, and the soldiers were in excellent spirits.

The proper force having been ascertained, the advance took place before daylight, the post of honor being assigned to Captain McKim, in the independent regiments.

The independent rangers behaved remarkably well, getting close up to the enemy, within a distance of only seventy-five yards of the enemy.

Colonel Jarrett and Lieutenant Colonel Coulter led the advance, opening upon them at four hundred yards.

The whole of the rebel force at Martinsburg, consisting of four regiments of infantry and one regiment of horse, were engaged in the action.

The first stand was made at Porterfield Farm on the turnpike, near Haynesville, where it was necessary to destroy a barn and carriage house to make a charge upon the enemy.
