

Major General McClellan on the Irish Brigade.

In reply to an invitation to be present at the St. Patrick's celebration of the Irish Brigade, in camp near Pamunkey, Virginia, Brigadier General Meagher received the following letter from General McClellan, which contains one of the finest eulogiums yet pronounced upon the valor of the brigade—

My DEAR GENERAL—It is not in my power to reply to the kind invitation to be present at your celebration of the day, in time for you to receive it at your meeting. Please convey to your officers my warmest thanks for their kind remembrance of me, and say to them that, whatever may be my future fate, I can never so long as I live, forget my Irish Brigade, whose green flags I have seen so steadily and nobly at Antietam. My warmest friendship and admiration will follow your fortunes wherever you may go, and I know that every field on which the brigade may be placed hereafter, will only add new laurels to the already so praiseworthy I am, my dear General, most truly your friend.

INDIAN INDICTION IN NEW YORK.—Far more than we know are from the hands of the Indian and the home of the wild man, we learn that New York is in danger of being invaded in the course of a few days by some of the most warlike tribes of Indians. The Cheyennes, Kowas, Apaches, Arapahoes, Camanches and Caddos, are all coming, armed, painted, and duly equipped in the full array of the war-savage. The simple fact being that representative chiefs of those tribes of the fighting nations of the Far West are at present in Washington, awaiting the pleasure of the President. They have been objects of intense curiosity in the national capital, and an invitation has been tendered to them to come to New York. Major Colby, their agent, Colonel French and Mr. Smith, the interpreter, are likely to accompany them, and remain during their stay. To see the Indians will be the sensation on Broadway before many days are over.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

SUNDAY, April 5, 1863. The foreign trade of the port for the week which ended yesterday was large, notwithstanding the fluctuations in exchange. The import entries of foreign merchandise, exclusive of dry goods, were \$2,665,967, to which the value of the dry goods imported, \$2,073,598, and the aggregate foots up \$4,739,565. Against this we exported \$4,434,075 of produce and merchandise and \$473,435 of specie, in all \$5,007,510. For the first time for many weeks the imports exceed the exports in value, and specie is due to make up the difference. In consequence of the fall in gold the exportation of American securities to Europe has been checked, and is now stopped altogether.

The Treasury Department, as usual, has proved leaky in the matter of the commercial statistics for the fiscal year ending on the 30th of June last, and some general statements have been either sold in advance of publication by clerks in the department, or surreptitiously copied. They go to show that the trade of the year 1861-2 was as follows:—

Balance in favor of the country, \$23,970,467. The imports are the lightest on record since 1860; the exports of produce the lightest since 1852. It would seem that we have curtailed our consumption of foreign goods almost as rapidly as the war has curtailed our supply of the Southern staples. The export of specie in excess of that of the fiscal year 1860-1, during most of which year the foreign exchanges ruled in favor of this country; but it is less than that of every previous year since 1853. Later on the specie export has increased, and the current fiscal year, 1862-3, will come up to the old average. The export of agricultural produce in 1861-2 is set down at \$134,561,114, against a previous average of less than \$50,000,000. The cotton export has fallen from \$191,806,555 in 1860 to less than \$2,000,000 in 1861-2. The Southern rebellion has inflicted this injury upon foreign industry and our own commerce.

Gold fluctuated last week very actively. It opened at 143, rose to 160, and closed at 155. The decline from 73 to 130, though largely assisted by the legislation of Congress prohibiting loans on gold, and the consequent breakdown in the bull speculation in the staple, was in the main due to a general improvement in public confidence, which proves to have been at least premature, if not baseless. Nothing in the current news of the day has justified the rise in the national currency; on the contrary, the prospect, military and naval, seems at least as gloomy as it was when gold was selling at 170. Nothing has been definitely ascertained with regard to the probability of the State Legislature on the subject of gold loans. The Senate has amended Mr. Dean's bill so as to prohibit all loans of whatever amount on gold or exchange. But well informed parties at Albany state that, on the one hand, the agricultural interests, whose produce sells with gold, and, on the other, the importing interests, which will be ruined by a heavy and sudden decline, have brought to bear on the Legislature an influence which will prevent the passage of any bill this session. It is urged with great earnestness by the New York bankers that the law of Congress accomplishes all that can be reasonably desired for the protection of the national currency, and that local legislation, imposing restraints on free trade at New York, would only have the effect of transferring business to Boston and Philadelphia. Some foreign merchants are already preparing to transfer their means and their bank account, to England.

from the prices which ruled a week ago, when the market was unduly depressed by accidental causes. The earnings of the roads for March come in from day to day, showing a large increase over last year, which was a very satisfactory season. On the Western roads the increase is from 30 to 50 per cent. On the New York roads it is very large indeed. The Erie will probably show \$225,000 for March. The Hudson River road is earning, at the present time, over 20 per cent on its stock, and quarterly dividends are talked of. The general tendency of the market is seemingly upward; but this is resisted with considerable vigor by the bears, who put out their options with confidence. The bulls are firm believers in the inevitable tendency of paper money toward inflation, and seem disposed patiently to await the speculative excitement, which can hardly fail to come, sooner or later.
