

NEWS FROM WASHINGTON.

COURT MARTIAL OF A CAVALRY OFFICER.

A court martial has been convened here for the trial of a cavalry officer on the charge of committing rape upon the person of a negro woman in Maryland.

THE BUSINESS OF THE LAND OFFICE.

The pressure of business upon the General Land Office has again become very great. One day this week that office received two hundred and thirty-eight letters and packages, one of which contained one hundred and eighty papers. The cash receipts are rapidly increasing, and in the course of a month or two bid fair to exceed any ever previously attained.

The Postmaster General has invited bids to reduce the running time four days from the Atlantic to the Pacific for the conveyance of the letter mail only, as well as the entire mail.

GENERAL ADJUTANT ON AN INSPECTING TOUR.

General Augur started on Tuesday for the Upper Potomac on an extensive inspecting tour. A large number of Union families are moving within the defenses from Fairfax county, desiring it unsafe to remain during the winter in a section lately by guerrillas.

The old press was built in 1711, and was thus one hundred and fifty three years old when it was taken to New York.
