The Hamburg steamship Albatross, which left Southampton on the 20th ult., arrived at this port yesterday with three days later news from Europe.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Connection votes to-day on the negro suffrage question. Of the New England States Connecticut is the only one which has hitherto repudiated negro suffrage.

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The post at Lynchburg since Lee's surrender, has been treated on the charge, together with A. W. Lackey, sister of the post. General Briscoe is an Irishman.

As an appendix to the list of the rebel bondholders in high places in England, the list of members who composed the Southern Independence Association will be read with considerable interest.

The coal miners' strike in the Lackawanna valley has come to an end. Through this fortunate occurrence some twelve or thirteen thousand tons will be added to the daily coal supply.

The Richmond, Va., Commercial Bulletin has been suppressed by General Terry for an article grossly reflecting upon the etiquette of the White House and President Johnson's visitors.

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A full communion in the affairs of the general government, we concur in the wisdom of the postponement of the difficult question of Southern negro suffrage to a more convenient season.

But while the postponement of the question of the negro's political rights may be carried through Congress by the President on the ground of more urgent considerations, we apprehend that the withholding of all civil rights from the emancipated blacks will meet with an obstruction in the President himself.
