THE NEWS.

THE CITY.

It is alleged that the railroad which has been extended through Broadway was laid down with an obliquity in the charter of the road. The obstruction to travel yesterday was very great. It is almost impossible for the cars of the Dry Dock and East Broadway Company to pass, and passengers up and down town yesterday generally avoided the cars of the line, preferring those of the second and third avenues.

The United States steamer Blonville, arrived from St. Thomas yesterday with eighteen cases of fever on board. Three of the crew, named unknown, died on the ship. The vessel is in quarantine.

A meeting to ratify the State Democratic ticket was held last evening at the Cooper Institute. The proceedings were of a very tame character, lacking very much the old spirit that pervaded such political gatherings a few years ago.

There were three cases of cholera and two deaths from cholera in this city yesterday.

William Wallace, a three-year-old child, died yesterday from falling down an arched stair.

The propeller Clayton sank at Favona ferry on Sunday night. More arrests for alleged illegal registry were made yesterday.

John Foster, under examination in the U. S. Commissioner's office for counterfeiting, has been committed for trial.

Philip Melling has been committed to \$1,000 bail to answer the charge of torting Judge Menell's name to a newspaper.

The Grand Jury has found a bill of indictment against Lieutenant Braine, the Chesapeake pirate, and he is to be tried before the United States Circuit Court in November.

James Smyth, foreman at the drug store of Reynolds, Platt & Co., committed suicide yesterday, on account of a difficulty with the bookkeeper.

The total number of deaths in Brooklyn during the week ending Saturday was one hundred and sixty-one, of which thirty were men, thirty-nine women, fifty-eight boys and thirty-four girls.

The steamership, Morro Castle, Captain R. Adams, belonging to Garrison & Allen's Atlantic Mail Steamship line, will sail at three P. M. to-day for Havana direct.

The stock market was irregular, closing firm yesterday. Quietude was the prevailing feature in most departments of trade yesterday, and though there were some noteworthy exceptions to the general rule, the volume of business was much circumscribed.

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The Penian excitement has extended to all parts of the country and Canada, and offers of aid and assistance in the prosecution of any design for the liberation of the convicted prisoners continue to pour upon the officials of the order in New York city.

The schooner Arching put into Fortness Monroe, on the 29th, with all the crew sick except Captain Hayes and a small boy.

Bishop Lynch visited St. John's on the 29th. He states that the state prisoner's health is much improved.

James Lewis, one of the alleged murderers of Rev. J. C. R. Bond, attempted suicide by cutting his throat at Poughkeepsie yesterday.

We publish this morning highly interesting evidence elicited in the case of the Baltimore Police Commissioner. The case for the defence was opened yesterday, and it is expected that a decision will be rendered by the Governor to-day.

The first of the match games of billiards between McDeritt and Goldthwaite was won by the former last night in Boston, in a series of the most remarkable runs on record, beating his opponent over five hundred points.

The Southern Politicians on the Constitutional Amendment. The old ruling class of Southern politicians, as by a common instinct of self-preservation against their "manifest destiny," are coming out in fierce hostility against the constitutional amendment proposed by Congress as the basis of Southern restoration.

The committee in this report begins with the objection of Mr. Sharkey, of Mississippi, late Provisional Governor—that as the constitution contemplates the participation by all the States, through their representatives in Congress, in proposing amendments, and that "as representatives from nearly one-third of the States were excluded from the Congress proposing this amendment," this whole proceeding is a nullity.

Thus this report goes on to say that this amendment in "its first section proposes to deprive the States of the right which they have possessed since the revolution of 1776—to determine what shall constitute citizenship of a State," and that "its object is to declare negroes to be citizens of the United States and of the several States." Just so. But the committee do not think it proper or desirable that "the broad, comprehensive principles" which from the beginning have pervaded the constitution on this subject should be abandoned.

This Texas committee next object to the second section as a scheme "to force negro suffrage upon the Southern States." But it is no such thing. Each State may regulate its suffrage as it sees fit.

Here again, however, this committee harp upon the old constitution, as if they expected within a few days to advertise for the recapture of their missing slaves. Of the third section of the amendment, excluding from civil offices, federal and State, till absolved by a two-thirds vote of Congress, all persons guilty of violating, by joining the late rebellion, an official oath to support the constitution, this Texas committee say "it proposes to stigmatize and degrade all that is most elevated and most worthy, and it coolly asks us to be the instruments of the degradation of our own people."

The fourth section of the amendment, relating to the national debt, all rebel debts and obligations and to claims for emancipated slaves, this report says has been sufficiently provided for by the action of the late Texas State Convention. But another State Convention may repudiate all this work unless it is fixed in the federal constitution—the supreme law of the land.

The news from Washington indicates that the programme which we laid down some days ago for the settlement of the difficulties concerning Mexico is about to be carried out. There is probably an understanding, or one being matured, between our government and that of France, as well as between ours and President Juarez, of Mexico, relative to a final solution of that troublesome question.

The ruling Southern politicians of the old fire-eating and domineering school of the Southern chivalry may denounce it and fight against it and array their State Legislatures in opposition to it; but the North will hold it as its ultimatum; and so this year or next year, or in this generation or the next, this amendment will be carried through.

The difficulties that lie in the way of the crystallization of a great German empire around Prussia, and that now threaten some embarrassments in the consolidation of the new Power, will disappear. Prussia has in her favor the great fact that she goes with the inevitable tendency of the age—that she is up to the spirit of the time.
