SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE HERALD.

ALBANY, Jan. 18, 1867. The war between the Hudson River and New York Central railroads causes great excitement here, and has led to the introduction of several bills, with a view to preventing further inconveniences to the traveling public. In the Senate this morning Senator H. C. Murphy, of Broeklyn, presented a bill to prevent delays in the transport of passengers and freight over railroads in this State, which was passed after a few explanatory remarks.
