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LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE.

SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE HERALD.

Introduction of Resolutions Declaring the Sherwin Bill Unconstitutional and Demanded a Test of It in the Supreme Court.

In the State Senate to-day Mr. Munday presented a set of resolutions declaring the Military Reconstruction bill unconstitutional in ignoring the legal existence of the States; in interfering with the suffrage rights and eligibility to office in State elections; in depriving said States of participation in the rights and privileges of the general government, while they are fully taxed, and on delivering over to irresponsible commissioners, and with injudicious powers, a whole people, and for more than eighteen months past pursuing the avocation of a yielding and a cheerful obedience to the general government.

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NEW JERSEY INTELLIGENCE.

DETENTION OF TRAINS.—The Steamboat Line.—The Washington and Philadelphia train due yesterday morning at the Jersey City depot was two hours late, and the train on the same line due at twenty minutes past the last night did not leave Philadelphia till half-past nine by which it was due at one o'clock this morning in New York. The first obstruction was caused by a train below Philadelphia, and the latter by an accident to a locomotive on the Baltimore road.

ACTION OF THE MASS.—The Jurorsman masquerade held a meeting at No. 192 Broad street on Monday evening, when they resolved to continue on strike until the employers acceded to their demand of \$4 per day. Several of the master masquerade have already notified their employers of their willingness to pay the wages demanded, while others are engaging hands from a distance to supply the place of those men who will stand out. It is probable, however, that a settlement of the difficulties will soon be made.

THE CASE OF RUI.—The New Jersey Court of Pardons will meet this evening at Trenton, in the Executive Chamber. Among other applications for pardon, the case of Charles F. Ruh will be considered. It will be remembered that Ruh was found guilty of being a soldier in the case of Barclay Haines, convicted also of bribery, and was only sentenced to pay a fine, and it is thought by many that there was partiality shown in the case of the latter.

THE CHAMBER ELECTION.—REPUBLICAN VICTORY.—The Orange Chamber election was held yesterday, and resulted in a republican victory by 25 majority. The following town officers were chosen: Mayor, Edward H. Ensign; Clerk, Mark A. Ward; Treasurer, James C. Harlan; Supervisors, Samuel D. Jackson and Samuel J. Harlan; Joseph C. Tomkins, Messrs. Ensign and Harlan, two of the successful candidates, ran on both party tickets, while others are democratic. In the First ward no democratic ticket was nominated. In the Second ward the republican ticket was nominated, and in the Third ward no republican ticket was nominated, and the following democratic candidates were elected:—Committee, Ward, J. Steen and George Spottswode; the latter to fill vacancy; Chosen Freeholder, John H. Matthews. Very little interest was taken in the election, and many New York merchants who reside in Orange failed to deposit their ballots. The republicans had a majority at the last election of 60.

REGULATION.—The authorities of Paterson recently passed an ordinance regulating the speed of Erie railway trains through the city to six miles an hour. The company have now stopped selling excursion tickets between that city and New York, and much inconvenience is felt by the people of Paterson on account thereof.

BURGLARY IN MERCER STREET.—Between nine and ten o'clock last night some parties, who are thus far unknown to the police, obtained entrance to the store of Mortimer & Debat, located at the corner of Mercer and Broadway, and removed from the store two rolls of cloth, valued at about \$400. Becoming frightened, however, by the approach of some passers by, the burglars dropped their plunder and took to the streets. One of the best finds of the night, and the other was found lying on the sidewalk beside the gutter. The cloth was taken to the station and identified as having been stolen from their premises. Search is being made for the burglars.
