ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD. THE PAPAL STATES. SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE HERALD.

THE LATEST REPORTS RECEIVED IN THIS CITY FROM THE SEAT OF WAR IN THE PONTICAL TERRITORY STATE THAT KIRISHES CONTINUE TO TAKE PLACE BETWEEN THE ITALIAN REVOLUTIONARY INVADERS, AIDED BY NATIVE INSURGENTS AND THE FORCES OF THE POPE, AT MANY POINTS OF CONFLICT.

THE ACTUAL SITUATION MILITARY AND DIPLOMATIC, OF THE ITALO-ROMAN COMPLICATION REMAINS UNCHANGED.

THE ACCOUNTS, BY TELEGRAM AND MAIL, OF THE FIGHTING, AND ITS PROBABLE RESULTS, ARE VERY CONFLICTING. AS IS THE CASE IN THE COMMENCEMENT OF MOST EVERY CONTENT AT ARMS—GREAT OR LESS—BOTH SIDES CLAIM TO HAVE OBTAINED ADVANTAGES.

NO VERY IMPORTANT ENGAGEMENTS HAVE, HOWEVER, TAKEN PLACE, AND THE FIGHTING IS OF RATHER A DESULTORY CHARACTER—THE REVOLUTIONISTS MOVING, FOR THE MOST PART, QUICKLY FROM ONE AVAILABLE POINT TO ANOTHER, AND THE PAPAL TROOPS MARCHING AFTER OR IN FLANK OF THEM, AS SEEMS BEST TO THEIR COMMANDERS.

ITALY. SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE HERALD.

NEWS FROM THE SEAT OF WAR—BATTLE BETWEEN THE PAPAL TROOPS AND THE COMMAND OF MENOTTI GARIBALDI—THE POPE'S SOLDIERS DRIVEN IN DISORDER.

THE LATEST DISPATCH FROM THE PAPAL PROVINCES IN THE SOUTH, DATED YESTERDAY (MONDAY) EVENING, SAYS THAT A DETACHMENT OF THE POPE'S ARMY, MADE UP FOR THE MOST PART OF CAVALRY AND ARTILLERY, HAD A SHORT TIME BEFORE ASSAULTED THE TOWN OF VEROLA, WHERE THE INSURGENTS WERE CONCENTRATED IN FORCE UNDER THE COMMAND OF MENOTTI GARIBALDI, WHO IS NOW GENERALISSIMO OF THE TROOPS OF THE "PARIA OF ACTION" BY VIRTUE OF A COMMISSION DELEGATED TO HIM FROM HIS FATHER, THE GENERAL.

A SHARP ENGAGEMENT ENDED AFTER THE ATTACK, WHICH ENDED IN THE DEFEAT OF THE PAPAL TROOPS. AFTER OBTAINING THE FIRST ADVANTAGE THE GARIBALDIANS ADVANCED FROM THE TOWN, AND THE RETIRING SOLDIERS OF HIS HOLINESS WERE DRIVEN TO MONTE MAGGIORE IN DISORDER.

THE ITALO-ROMAN WAR—OFFICIAL REPORT OF A PAPAL VICTORY.

PARIS, OCTOBER 15—P. M. THE OFFICIAL MONITEUR, IN ITS ISSUE OF TO-DAY, SAYS THAT THE PAPAL TROOPS OPERATING IN THE PONTICAL PROVINCES ON SUNDAY LAST, THE 13TH INSTANT, ATTACKED AND DEFEATED A FORCE OF GARIBALDIAN INVADERS WHO WERE POSTED IN A GOOD POSITION WHERE THEY BARRED THE LINE OF ADVANCE TO MONTE-LIBRATA.

THE PAPAL PROVINCES.

SEVERE FIGHTING IN FROSINONE—JUNCTION OF THE GARIBALDIAN DIVISIONS—BATTLE BETWEEN MENOTTI GARIBALDI'S COMMAND AND A PAPAL DETACHMENT—DEFEAT AND HEAVY LOSS OF THE POPE'S SOLDIERS—THE POPE MAY RETIRE TO SAVANNA.

THE REVOLUTIONARY BANDS WHICH ENTERED THE PAPAL STATES AT DIFFERENT POINTS ON THE EASTERN AND SOUTHERN FRONTIER HAVE CONCENTRATED IN FROSINONE UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF MENOTTI GARIBALDI, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE DIRECTIONS OF GENERAL GARIBALDI.

THE REPORT THAT MENOTTI HAD BEEN ARRESTED PROVES TO BE WITHOUT FOUNDATION.

PARIS, OCT. 15—EVENING. EXCITING NEWS FROM THE SOUTH HAS JUST BEEN RECEIVED. A BATTLE HAS BEEN FOUGHT NEAR VEROLA, IN THE PROVINCE OF FROSINONE, BETWEEN THE GARIBALDIAN VOLUNTEERS AND THE PONTICAL TROOPS, IN WHICH THE FORMER WERE VICTORIOUS.

A STRONG DETACHMENT OF PAPAL ZOUAVES WAS SENT FROM ROME DURING THE LATTER PART OF LAST WEEK TO PREVENT THE JUNCTION OF THE INSURGENT BANDS IN FROSINONE WITH THE PARTY UNDER MENOTTI GARIBALDI, WHO WAS REPORTED TO BE IN THAT PROVINCE. THEY WERE UNSUCCESSFUL IN ACCOMPLISHING THIS OBJECT, AND WERE OBLIGED TO MEET THE UNITED FORCES OF THE INSURGENTS UNDER THE COMMAND OF GENERAL MENOTTI GARIBALDI IN PERSON.

A DESPERATE FIGHT TOOK PLACE OUTSIDE THE TOWN OF VEROLA. THE PAPAL ZOUAVES WERE BADLY BEATEN, LOSING HEAVILY IN KILLED AND WOUNDED.

THE GARIBALDIANS LOSE FIVE KILLED AND FIFTEEN WOUNDED. NO REPORT IS GIVEN OF THE NUMBERS ENGAGED ON EITHER SIDE.

THE NEWS IS RECEIVED WITH GREAT REJOICING BY THE PEOPLE HERE.

PARIS, OCT. 15, 1867. IT IS REPORTED THAT IF THE CONDITION OF AFFAIRS AROUND ROME SHOULD BECOME CRITICAL THE POPE WILL LEAVE THE CITY AND TAKE REFUGE IN SAVANNA, WHERE HE HAS BEEN OFFERED AN ASYLUM.

GENERAL JOSEPH GARIBALDI AND JOSEPH MANZONI EXHIBIT THE ITALIANS TO ACTION—KING VICTOR EMANUELE'S TROOPS MAY ENTER ROME.

THE FOLLOWING LATER DESPATCHES FROM ITALY HAVE BEEN RECEIVED TO-NIGHT—

FLORENCE, OCT. 15—EVENING. GENERAL GARIBALDI HAS SENT OUT ANOTHER ADDRESS FROM CAPRA, IN WHICH HE EARNESTLY CALLS UPON THE ITALIAN NATION TO ARM.

TRIN, OCT. 15—EVENING. MANZONI HAS ISSUED A MANIFESTO, IN WHICH HE EXHORTS THE ITALIAN PATRIOTS IN ROME TO RISE AND PROCLAIM A REPUBLIC.

FLORENCE, OCT. 15—EVENING-LATER. MANY PEOPLE HERE BELIEVE THAT GENERAL LA MORNA, WHO IS IN COMMAND OF THE PAPAL TROOPS, WILL ORDER HIS TROOPS TO CROSS THE LINE AND OCCUPY THE PONTICAL TERRITORY, AND POSSIBLY MARCH ON ROME.

General Sheridan at Cleveland, En Route to Columbus. Cleveland, Oct. 15, 1867. General P. Sheridan passed through this city this evening, en route to Columbus and the West. He was met at the depot by an enthusiastic crowd, and after thanking them for the welcome and with cheers for the "little hero," the train started off.

Disturbance at a Circus—A Young Woman Shot Dead. Columbus, Oct. 15, 1867. A disturbance occurred at Franch's circus, at Eaton, Peble county, Ohio, last night, during which a man named Tom Thomas fired upon the ring master, but missing him, the ball struck a young lady named Campbell, killing her instantly, the bullet passing through her heart.

Loss of a Propeller on Lake Michigan—Two Children Drowned. Milwaukee, Oct. 15, 1867. The small propeller Waukegan, on the eastern shore, was lost in a storm at the mouth of the Kalamazoo river on Saturday. The passengers and crew were rescued except two children of Rev. John C. Johnson, who were lost.

Row Between Radicals and Negroes. A row occurred yesterday at a radical nominating convention in the city of Williamsburg, Va., between D. B. White, a radical stamper, an ex-colonel of negro troops and a candidate for the convention, and a negro named Dr. Norton, another candidate.

Treasury Circular—Conversion of Seventy-Thirties into Five-Twenties. The following was issued this morning: Treasury Department, Oct. 15, 1867.

The Department is prepared to give five twenty bonds of 1867 in exchange for seven and three-tenths notes, the interest to be charged on the bonds and allowed on the notes up to the date of conversion.
