BRAZILIAN EMIGRATION

During the late civil war in the United States a large proportion of the southern people, as well as their friends and sympathizers in the North, taking counsel from their fears of the radical policy threatened by Congress, set on foot various schemes of emigration.

In addition to the immunities and other advantages granted to vessels bringing emigrants the Brazilian government has granted to the latter—

1. The freedom of the soil, in respect of their baggage and all instruments of machinery which they bring with them for their respective professions.

2. The payment for account of the State, to the extent of the value of the goods, of the duties on the importation of the goods, and of the duties on the exportation of the goods.

3. The exemption from the payment of duties on the importation of the goods, and of the duties on the exportation of the goods.

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SOUTH CAROLINA.

Special Correspondence of the Herald. Important Discovery of Smuggling in Georgetown. The discovery of a large quantity of contraband goods, valued at \$100,000, was made at Georgetown, S. C., on the 21st inst.

Mr. J. E. Wiggins, special agent of the United States Treasury Department, and well known in your city in connection with some extensive Custom House frauds, arrived here a few days ago and has made very important arrests, including some twenty or more of the most prominent merchants and highly influential citizens of Georgetown, S. C.

Last Sunday Mr. Wiggins observed the steamer "Placer," and accompanied by United States Marshal Epping and a constabulary force, visited Georgetown and arrested a prominent public officer, several merchants, their employes and others. He also seized the books and papers and the shipping in port on the charge of smuggling.

The party returned to the city with the books and papers of the parties, and on Monday morning their arrival at the Custom House was awaited with interest. The party consisted of about twenty persons, who were released by giving \$10,000 bail.

The case comes up for trial before Judge Bryan on Monday next, and promises to be highly interesting. The present arrests will, it is believed, have a salutary effect on the trade of Georgetown, and will tend to put an end to the "ring" of smugglers, who have no doubt been keeping up for the last year or eighteen months.
