

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

MEXICO.

The National Authorities Levying Forced Loans—National Troops Occupy Mazatlan—Martinez Abandons the Command of the Rebels—Arrival of Corona—Coal Wanted at Pichilago—Whalers and Whaling.

On the morning of the 18th instant, ex-Lieutenant Colonel Calvillo was publicly shot for the wilful murder of a Spaniard named Orozco, who was a member of Chaurin's circus, now performing here.

General Martines issued a final proclamation at Culiacan, on the 16th, announcing his abandonment of the revolutionary army and his return to so-called private life.

General Corona arrived here yesterday. This evening his friends greeted him with bands of music and illuminations as military commander of the district.

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ENGLAND. Opinion on the Ministerial Crisis—Hope of a Temporary Party Compromise. LONDON, May 2, 1868.

THE crisis in the British Cabinet occasioned by the recent divisions on the subject of the Irish Church monopolizes the public attention to-day.

It is thought that if the measures which are in effect approved by both parties are not opposed by the liberals the present Cabinet will not resign or dissolve Parliament until an appeal is made to the new constituencies created by the Reform bill.

THE first denounces the measures of Congress looking to the reconstruction of the Southern States, and declares them despotic and unworthy of support by the people.

THE second declares that by his present policy Congress has violated the resolutions of 1861, which assured the people of the country and of the world that the war was not to be waged for conquest.

THE third characterizes the impeachment and trial of President Johnson as an act of party violence, and tending to bring the republic into ridicule and contempt.

THE fourth eulogizes Governor Halset, endorses his past and present course and declares him one of the rising great men of the country.

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ILLINOIS. The Methodist Episcopal Conference—Admitting Colored Members—Long Debate. CHICAGO, May 2, 1868.

THE Methodist Episcopal Conference met, at nine o'clock this morning, Bishop Simpson in the chair. The services were opened with singing, and prayer by the Rev. T. M. Hudson, of Pittsburg.

THE Journal of yesterday's session was read. The Committee on Episcopacy announced their organization by the election of Rev. Dr. Trimble, chairman, and Rev. J. W. Lindsay, secretary.

THE Committee on Episcopacy also reported the election of Rev. J. T. Peck, chairman, Dr. Nesbit, secretary; Rev. J. Creed, ex-grossing clerk. Rev. Dr. Eddy asked reconsideration of the vote of yesterday by which the colonization cause was referred to the General Convention.

THE motion was carried, and the subject was referred to a special committee. This motion elicited considerable discussion, in which Dr. Wise, Hunter, Crane and others participated, and which developed a decided opposition to the Colonization Society's objects and methods.

THE Secretary then called the roll of the conferences and various petitions were presented, mostly in favor of lay delegations.

THE delegations of annual conferences and the preceding elders of the year were called, and the Secretary was ordered to insert the Washington and Delaware conferences in the list of conferences.

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JEFF DAVIS. Renewal of His Bail Bond—The Present Situation—Time of the Trial. RICHMOND, May 2, 1868.

THE bail bond of Jefferson Davis was renewed to-day, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Gerrit Smith and Horace Greeley being sureties in the sum of \$25,000, and several citizens of Richmond sureties for the remaining \$25,000.

THE arrangement was made by order of the three gentlemen named. By the conditions of the new bond Mr. Davis is to appear for trial on any day after the 15th of May hereafter.

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LOUISIANA. The Recent Election—Radical Majorities—Political News. NEW ORLEANS, May 2, 1868.

NO official returns of the recent election have been published by the military authorities. The radical organ of the city publishes a list of unofficial returns from all the parishes, which gave the constitution a majority of 17,891.

THE radical candidate for Governor is elected by a somewhat larger majority. The Legislature is claimed to be radical in both Houses by the following majorities:—In the Senate, radicals 22 and democrats 14; and in the House, radicals 60 and democrats 41.
