

MEXICO.

President Juarez's Address on the Opening of Congress—All Quiet but Tamulipas—Hunting Down Bandits—General Cases—Internal and His Plea for Patrons' Murder—Internal Improvements.

The state of public affairs continues about the same, and, excepting the local movement in the State of Tamulipas, the whole country is enjoying peace and order, and, indeed, that local perturbation is of but little importance and it is believed that it will be entirely quelled within a few days, for not only the authorities have taken the necessary steps to prevent a continuance of the incipient evil, but the entire population is tired of anarchy and co-operates with the government, under all circumstances, to maintain law and order.

A few mechanics desirous of establishing a discount and savings bank in the State of Jalisco have been assisted by several capitalists, among whom are Messrs. F. Palomar, Negrete, Rodriguez and Zaragoza.

In F. Verde, Tamulipas, a society has been formed for the promotion of internal improvements. By a decree of the 15th inst. the President has authorized, for three months, the introduction of foreign corn into Jalisco free of all duties, for the consumption of the State of Yucatan, and for every 100 pounds of corn three barrels of flour, weighing 10 pounds each. For four months after the expiration of said three months these articles cannot be sent to any other State of the republic.

PORTO RICO.

Serious Revolt in the Island—The Prisoners to Be Shot—Fears of a Negro Insurrection—A Venezuelan at the Head of the Affair.

By the French steamer which arrived at this port yesterday we have St. Thomas dates to the 1st inst. An insurrection had broken out in Porto Rico, the accounts concerning which are very contradictory. One is to the following effect:—The natives of the island had taken to arms, and had succeeded in bringing into the field an army of 4,000, well equipped and armed with American breech-loaders. They had made the interior town of Lares their headquarters and stronghold. This they had strongly fortified and had established a temporary government. The names of the leaders were not known. An engagement had been fought with the royal troops near Lares, in which both sides suffered severely, the latter the most so. An outbreak was feared among the native troops of the army, of whom there are 10,000 on the island.

Another account, which has not been confirmed, is that the insurrection had broken out there, instigated by our officers, who had been heavily armed and had incited their blacks to rising to relieve them from their black yoke. They had attacked the small town of Lares, but were repulsed and two killed. This, with Lares, was the only town which had been disturbed. Troops had been sent to Lares and San Juan, and the latest accounts all are quiet.
