THE BROKEN BROTHER.

Continuation of the Coroner's Inquest—Several Persons Committed to Jail. The inquest on the body of John Passell, commenced on Tuesday evening, was continued last evening. The testimony given thus far is merely a recital of the facts already given in a condensed form regarding the squabble which led to the perpetration of the bloody deed. The court room was densely crowded. Great excitement prevails among the German populace. Gustave and Emil Hausmann, Chas. Jungo, Fritz Gloede and Heinrich Breier, who were committed to the County Jail, were present.

Mary Gerold identified Gustave Hausmann as the person who struck deceased. The next witness was Fritz Gloede, who, having been sworn, deposed as follows:—I told Mr. Stuber that I knew Passell had fallen out of the window; I did not know then who it had been killed; Emil Hausmann approached me with a knife during the affair, and on looking around I saw the deceased falling; at that time Gustave Hausmann was at the front door; John Stuber and I then went to the stairs, where I saw that he had run by me as I stood in the hallway; I did not perceive any weapons in the hands of either of the Hausmanns, nor did I myself; Emil Hausmann struck me on the forehead with a brick, and I fell over my bed room; I defended myself; Emil declared he would kill me; Gustave, at a distance, said something about the matter; I do not know what he said; I was then sober; Mrs. Gerold was not in the yard at the time of the affair; Heinrich Breier and Hausmann were in the hall at the same time; Heinrich Breier testified that he saw the body of the same house in which Passell lived; I went on Monday night to the house of Emil Hausmann; it being a night when the stars were shining brightly, morning Emil went down stairs, saying that some person was beating the dog; Hausmann and I went back up a knife with the stars, returning on the stairs and saw several men fighting in the hall; went up stairs before the light was over and remained there; Gustave Hausmann and his father came up and proceeded to dress his wounds; he picked up a knife and ran down stairs, returning quickly and then went to bed; there was a hammer in the room, but they did not make use of it, as far as I know; the greater portion of a keg of beer was consumed that night.
