VIRGINIA CITY, Nevada, April 18, 1899. THE HIDE FROM KENO.

The distance from Reno to this place is twenty-two miles, and the ride to me was extremely tedious; not but what the scenery was at times very fine and the country novel in appearance, but who is there that enjoys a stage coach ride in these days of steam?
