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NATIONAL TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.

Excursion to Saratoga Springs, Dinner at Congress Hall—Resolutions in Favor of a Postal Telegraph—Denunciation of the Associated Press.

The officers and members of the National Typographical Union, who were invited to the dinner at Congress Hall, were as follows: Mr. J. H. ...

Proceedings of the National Union—Report of the Committee on New Business—The Apprenticeship System and the Eight Hour Rule.

At the evening of the special report, the announcement of the death of members the past year, was proceeded with and the death of eight members announced.

The credentials of John K. Fairman, of the Elmira Union, were received and referred.

The committee on new business reported favorably on the proposition regarding the apprenticeship system, recommending a decrease in number and more strict discipline and servitude of apprentices in order that they may be taught the business of printing and the art of the printer.

Finance Committee reported various appropriations for expenses, etc., which were agreed to. The committee on the case of H. H. Cowles reported that he was clearly entitled to a seat as delegate from New Orleans.

Mr. DUNN, of Philadelphia, offered the following resolution: Whereas the Associated Press has virtually decreed that no newspaper shall be published in the United States, and that those in existence who do not obtain their news from the Associated Press shall be suppressed, etc.

Resolved, That a copy of the preamble and first resolution of the Associated Press be printed and distributed to every workingman. He wanted these resolutions adopted, and he with others would carry them before the people.

Mr. TROUP concurred with Mr. McKee, and denounced the Associated Press as the greatest and worst monopoly in the country; and this monopoly was the property of the printer and not of the workingman.

Mr. TROUP said that this Union did not prohibit any honorable man from coming into it. He would not start a cheap two-cent paper in New York, but he would start a two-cent paper in any other city.

Mr. TROUP said that he had no objection to the proposed new constitution was made a special order for to-morrow.

Mr. HALLOCK, of Washington, offered a series of resolutions regarding the National Typographical Union, which he intended to present to the Convention.

Mr. FLYNN thought it hardly fair at this hour (half-past eleven o'clock), to press action on such an important question.
