A NEW PUBLIC CHARITY. New York State Hospital for Diseases of the Nervous System—List of Officers—Objects of the Institution.

A meeting of the trustees of this recently incorporated charity was held at the residence of William H. Appleton, No. 3 Madison avenue, on the evening of the 23d inst. The following is a list of the trustees—William H. Appleton, George Y. Elliot, Edward Cooper, Lewis A. Sayre, H. C. Fehnestock, Thurston Wood, William A. Hammond, Rowell D. Hatch, Wm. H. Van Buren, Frederick S. Winston, James R. Wood, and Augustus M. Phelps.

The Board was completed by the unanimous election of the following officers—President, Wm. H. Appleton; Vice President, Thurston Wood; Treasurer, H. C. Fehnestock; Secretary, Rowell D. Hatch.

The following medical officers of the hospital were then unanimously elected—Physician-in-Chief, Dr. Austin Flint, Dr. George Y. Elliot; consulting surgeons, Dr. James R. Wood, Dr. Lewis A. Sayre. The physician-in-chief was authorized to appoint a resident physician and Dr. R. A. Vance was named for this position. A house physician and four clinical assistants are to be appointed after passing a satisfactory examination.

The objects of this hospital, as explained in the charter, are as follows—To give and furnish gratuitously to the poor and indigent of this State, and to the indigent of other States, the means of relief from the various diseases of the nervous system, especially those which are incurable, and to afford an opportunity to physicians and medical students for clinical observation and instruction in the special branches of science referred to in the first section of the charter.

The trustees are confident of being able to erect a suitable building shortly. For the present they will resort to.

The body of an unknown man, about forty-five years of age, was found floating in the water of pier 44, North River, yesterday afternoon, and made known to the police by a fisherman who had seen it on the pier. The body was taken to the morgue, whither it was removed.

William O'Brien, residing at No. 637 Washington street, was yesterday afternoon arrested before Justice Cox, at Jefferson Market, by officer Wignall, of the Ninth precinct, charged with striking his wife in the head with a tin snip, and with assaulting her. She is at present confined to her bed. Upon complaint of the officer he was committed to await the result of the inquest.

A bold robbery is reported to have been committed in Wall street yesterday afternoon. A gentleman bought from H. Grew & Co. \$2,500 of five-cent bonds, and then proceeded to the Gold Room, Wall street, where he was met by a man who offered him a large sum of money for the bonds. The pneumatic tunnel under Broadway is becoming a popular resort. Deceased was dressed in dark coat and dark pants; he had a punctured wound on the forehead, and a mark on the forehead, which death remains to be determined. The body apparently had been in the water a long time. It was removed to the morgue, and Coroner Keenan will hold an inquest.

James Moore, alias James Johnson, a notorious burglar, sneak and bond thief, was arraigned before Justice Cox at Jefferson Market yesterday afternoon, by two officers of the Broadway squad, in company with Joseph Keenan, of No. 110 Broadway. The prisoners were charged with stealing a silk umbrella, valued at \$100, from the store of J. H. Moore, at No. 110 Broadway. Moore a conveniently arranged overcoat, with numerous pockets in the inside, was found on his person, and various pieces of broadcloth, which he had stolen from the store of J. H. Moore, were also found on his person. The property was found in his possession, but were committed in default of bail to await.
