The Plebiscite Vote.

The following is the result of the voting as far as received up to five o'clock this morning:

Yes.....3,005,666 No.....705,156

The Returns "Coming In."

Full returns have not yet been received, but enough is known to make certain that the government has been sustained by an immense majority.

Yes (about).....6,400,000 No (about).....1,500,000

Estimated Total.

Paris, May 9—Noon.

The general result of the plebiscite vote is estimated as follows:

Yes.....6,500,000 No.....1,400,000

Late Returns.

Paris, May 9—6 o'clock P. M.

The returns received to this hour foot up:

Yes.....7,120,283 No.....1,484,844

The vote of the army, so far as known, stands:

Yes.....210,200 No.....36,598

It is estimated that, without counting the votes of the arrondissement, the army, the navy and Algeria, the government will have a majority of over 5,000,000.

The Army Vote.

Paris, May 9—1 P. M.

The morning journals have editorial articles on the result of the voting yesterday and comment particularly on the vote of the army.

The vote of the Seventh battalion of Chasseurs was about evenly divided.

At the Barracks Eugene the result showed 1,022 "yes," and 1,121 "no."

Twenty of the Cent Gard voted "no."

Only 15 of the Garde de Paris voted "no."

It is reported that two of the regiments at Vincennes refused to vote at all.

It is computed that the soldiers in Paris voted about as follows:

The vote of the troops serving in Algeria has not yet been received.

What the Navy Said.

Paris, May 9—1 P. M.

The vote cast by the navy is all in except that of two ports.

The result shows 15,455 yeas and 2,970 nays.

The vote of the sailors serving on the Algerian coast has not yet been received.
