

FRAUD AS A FINE ART.

Latest Particulars of the Notorious Forgery Case—The Case of the Attempted Fraud on Messrs. Glendinning, Davis & Co.—The Signature Turns Out to Be Genuine, but the Filling Up Altered—Arrest in Philadelphia Yesterday of the Criminal.

Further and most interesting developments have taken place in the great case of attempted forgery, the particulars of which were exclusively published in the HERALD yesterday. As was hoped, the author of the fraud, still ignorant of the discovery by his intended victims of his real character, presented himself yesterday morning at the Philadelphia banking house of Glendinning, Davis & Co. to obtain the value of the credit opened by his account in New York by the deposit of the fraudulent check for \$30,000, signed by Messrs. Wilmerding, Hugnet & Co., and payable by the Tenth National Bank, of this city. He was, of course, captured.

All through the course of Friday a diligent watch was maintained by the Philadelphia firm for the appearance of the mythical Mr. James Fields, and preparations were made to give him a fitting reception at the hands of a couple of detectives, who were posted in the neighborhood. He did not make a personal appearance, however, though there is some remaining as yet in a happy state of ignorance of the man who was lying in wait for him were given by the particulars detailed in the following letter from the Philadelphia firm to their New York partners, dated Friday night—

JOHN M. AMORY, Esq., New York:—DEAR SIR:—Mr. Glendinning went home rather early on account of there being no business doing, and your despatch of the 29th inst. was waiting patiently for Mr. Fields to make his appearance. He has been seen, however, and we are waiting for him to appear in a despatch addressed to him, and said he was in New York. I opened it and found this message, viz.:—"We have placed to your credit with Glendinning, Davis & Amory, \$30,000 in the best New York days' bill, signed Wilmerding, Hugnet & Co. From advice of the two detectives, whom I have had over in the back office all afternoon, I sent the despatch to you by express, telling them, as it was directed to corner Third and Chestnut, it would probably be called for. As yet, of course, it is not positively ascertained whether or not the man had any confederate. None of the facts of the case, however, require the action of the law.
