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OBITUARY.

Dr. H. Van Wyck Thorne. We announce this morning the death of Dr. H. Van Wyck Thorne, one of the oldest and most respectable citizens of Brooklyn...

Dr. Thorne was born at Great Neck, Long Island, on the 23d of December, 1777, upon the old homestead which has been the possession of the Thorne family for over two centuries...

Dr. Thorne received a good education, and after leaving school studied medicine under the well known naturalist, Dr. Samuel Mitchell, in 1800. By Harvey Spencer, Henry P. Marshall and John N. Warrens.

Dr. Thorne was a member of the Long Island Insurance Company, and was also the President of the Brooklyn Bank. Notwithstanding his great age his mind remained clear and vigorous to the last...

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TEACHER GALLAGHER'S TROUBLES.

IMPEACHMENT OF A SCHOOL PRINCIPAL. Charge of Intoxication—Alleged Want of Decorum in School—Female Teachers "Go for Him"—He is Sustained by Male Teachers and Others.

The Committee on Teachers of the Board of Education met yesterday afternoon at the Board rooms, corner of Elm and Grand streets, to investigate the charge of intoxication preferred against A. T. Gallagher, principal of Grammar School No. 31...

The first witness examined was Adelaide M. Thors, who testified as follows:—Have been a teacher in male department of Grammar School No. 31, of which Mr. Gallagher is principal; have seen him under the influence of liquor...

Examined by Mr. Tooker:—Mr. Gallagher asked me once within the last two months to make out a list for certificates; he spoke ugly to me, but did not increase me; about two months ago I and two other teachers were standing at my class room door and Mr. Gallagher came up and said, "Here, now, get out of here," and that hurt my feelings.

Mrs. Carrie V. Franklin, principal of Primary Department School No. 12, examined—Was a teacher in school No. 31 in 1865 and 1867; was in day school from October, 1867, to May, 1868; that time saw Mr. Gallagher repeatedly under the influence of liquor...

Examined by Mr. Tooker:—I am an unbiased witness; had conversations with school officers on this matter, but not since I was subpoenaed to attend here; never heard that Mr. Gallagher was drunk; never saw him drunk; he was sober; I thought I left school 13 on my own complaint and at my request.

Examined by Mr. Tooker:—I am a teacher in primary department of school No. 31; have no communication with Mr. Gallagher except on pay days; have never seen him under the influence of liquor a great many times.

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
