THE SAILING COURSE AND REGULATIONS.

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THE DIRECTION AND COURSE FOR THE START OF THE RACE.

The directions and course for the start of the important event are as follows:—The yachts will start at the buoy at the end of the pier at the lower landing, known as Vanderbilt's, Staten Island, about 200 yards from the shore, and another in an easterly direction, about 100 yards from the shore, between the two yachts will anchor in line about fifty yards apart. The first class sloops will anchor in same manner, fifty yards apart, and the second class sloops, fifty yards apart, about seventy-five yards from the shore.
