The rioters, the nose-breakers, got off with a fine of two hundred dollars each or twenty-nine days in the County Jail. It is a grand thing to see the law thus vindicated; but, as prevention is better than cure, let the voters of the sister city practice the motto beginning, "Eternal vigilance," &c.

Unchristian Commerce. Modern civilization and Christianization are promoted or retarded by modern commerce, and the missionaries of the various Church societies, both of Europe and America, in heathen lands find in it either their best friend or their worst enemy. Too often the latter is the case, and the good influence exerted on the heathen minds is counteracted or removed by the traffic of English opium vendors or American brandy, rum and tobacco dealers. And instead of being aided in the spread of Christian civilization its progress is prevented by this kind of commerce. Who ever heard of rum and tobacco and opium being made conducive to the promotion of integrity, morality and religion? Who ever heard of the heathen being converted by any such missionary agents as these? And yet they form the bulk of the traffic between Christian and heathen lands. The Christian Church of England and America supports missions and schools in India, China, Japan, Africa and elsewhere, and the Christian merchants of those nations sustain their warehouses and their commercial marine, at great expense, to supply those stimulants and narcotics which, in professedly Christian lands, debase and brutalize men, and which fill our prisons and workhouses with criminals and paupers. Consistency, where art thou fled? It may be that the very men who send the rum and tobacco to India and Africa also subscribe liberally to send missionaries to those dark lands. But whether they do or not, we know that hundreds of the traffickers in these poisons stand high in the Church at home and are honored and respected in commercial communities. What a strange anomaly is presented by Christian nations sending out on the same ship or steamer to heathen lands missionaries of the Gospel and kegs of rum, barrels of brandy or bales of tobacco! One keg or bale of the latter can do the life work of the former, and we know that here in our own midst these things demoralize instead of elevating men, and yet with our eyes open we go on year after year pursuing the same unchristian course, and with one hand pulling down what the other builds up.

But, it will be asked, what is to be done? What other articles of commerce can be found to supply the place of those we condemn? We answer there are hundreds and thousands of articles of commerce absolutely needed in heathen countries, and perfectly harmless—indeed, rather are they beneficial in their results. Any one who has read the interesting correspondence from the interior of Africa published in the HERALD recently—and every one who has not read it ought by all means to do so at once—must have noted the exception in the outfit of our Livingstone's expedition of either tobacco or liquors, or anything of that character, save as they may be included in the medical department. And yet without these things, and with an expedition larger than any missionary society has ever sent out, the HERALD's correspondent and his retinue have travelled five hundred and fifteen miles through the interior of Africa unharmed and untouched. Let our religious and missionary associations take account of this and bring their mitrailleuses to bear upon their members and friends who pursue the unchristian commerce of which we speak.

Recent arrivals of missionaries from Liberia and the Cape Coast of Africa assure us that as fast as colored youths are educated in the mission schools and made serviceable as teachers, colporteurs or missionaries, the captain or supercargo of some Christian merchant vessel seduces him away by the offer of larger salary or better prospects and sends him scouting along the coast for purchasers of his demoralizing drink. Like the slave trade, as long as the fountain of supply was kept open in Africa all our laws against that traffic and all our denunciations of its inhumanity were of no avail; so until we can cut off the rum traffic with India, China and Africa at its spring in Old England and in New England we shall never make much progress in civilizing or favorably impressing the heathen with the superiority of Christian morals. Here is a good subject for the pulpits of our land to work upon. Let them begin at once, and take their text from the HERALD.

THE SCAFFOLD. Execution of Bartholomew Barnes at Pittsfield, Ill., for the Murder of John Grisham. St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 30, 1871. Bartholomew Barnes was hanged at Pittsfield, Ill., yesterday, for the murder of John Grisham, an Ohioan county, last February. Barnes and Grisham had a difficulty some weeks previous to the murder, and Barnes threatened to kill Grisham's heart out. On the 21st of February they crossed the river from Carverville, Ill., together. Grisham was in a wagon with his son, aged fifteen years, and was drunk. Barnes asked to ride with them, and promising to behave himself, consent was given. Before they had proceeded far a quarrel took place, and Barnes choked Grisham and injured him. The seat board tipped and Grisham fell out on the opposite side of the wagon and lay on his back; then Barnes ran to the other side, and stamped him to death. The whiskey was the cause. The noise was put around his neck and the drop fell at his feet. He fell five feet and his neck was broken, producing death almost instantaneously.

SIGNALLING HER NATIONALITY.

TELEGRAMS TO THE NEW YORK HERALD. The following special despatch to the HERALD has been received from our correspondent in Nice, Italy, by way of London:— LONDON, Dec. 30, 1871.

A HERALD telegram, dated in Nice on Friday night, the 29th instant, reported in this city this morning that the United States frigate Wabash was entering Ville Franche harbor at the moment the despatch was forwarded from Italy. The vessel was burning signal lights, which indicated her identity. General Sherman was, probably, not on board the Wabash, as he intended to land and remain for a time at Cadix.

FRANCE.

Legislative Debate on the Bank Note Issue and Military Questions.

President Thiers' Theory of Silent Opposition to Bismarck—Financial Economy and State Necessity—Holiday Adjournment.

TELEGRAMS TO THE NEW YORK HERALD. PARIS, Dec. 30, 1871. The Assembly yesterday debated all day the question of augmenting the circulation of the Bank of France. The discussion took a wide range. President Thiers spoke several times, and on one occasion, alluding to the violent language used by Deputies provoked by the threats of the Germans, said, "silence was the best reply to the harsh words of M. Bismarck."

TELEGRAMS TO THE NEW YORK HERALD. PARIS, Dec. 30, 1871. The Assembly finally voted to increase the note circulation of the bank by 400,000,000 francs. At the close of the debate the session was adjourned until the 31st of January. Parliamentary Elections in Paris—Victor Hugo's Outline of a New Reform Bill. PARIS, Dec. 30, 1871. Supplementary elections are to be held in Paris to fill vacant seats in the Assembly. Victor Hugo has accepted a nomination on a platform of principles which embraces the abolition of capital punishment, the raising of the state of siege in Paris, the non-restoration of monarchy, a proclamation of general amnesty, the dissolution of the present Assembly and the removal of the seat of government to Paris.

The International Telegraph Conference Adjourned.

TELEGRAMS TO THE NEW YORK HERALD. LONDON, Dec. 30, 1871. The International Telegraph Conference at Rome has adjourned. Its next meeting will be at St. Petersburg, in 1872. The main object of the Assembly is for the purpose of revising the rules and regulations arrived at at the last conference at Vienna, special attention being given to the Indian service and the restrictions imposed on it by the Anglo-Indian government. Colonel Glover, managing director of the Indian and China Telegraph Companies, will represent the interests of the concerns.

SCOTLAND.

Fatal Explosion of a Steam Wagon in the Streets of Glasgow—Children Killed and Terribly Mutilated.

TELEGRAMS TO THE NEW YORK HERALD. GLASGOW, Dec. 30, 1871. While a large road wagon propelled by steam, and carrying heavy boilers, was passing through the streets to-day, surrounded and followed by a throng of children, one of the boilers exploded. Five children were killed outright and seven were so badly injured that their recovery is doubtful. The dead and injured were frightfully mutilated.
