The past week has been one of much excitement and great interest in Wall street, recording an event more than ordinary moment, involving results greater than usually take their origin in such questionable share.

THE ERIE MOVEMENT. The history of Wall street for the past week, so far as it has reference to the dealings on the Stock Exchange, is connected with the revolution in Erie.

Pending the election provided for in the Erie bills which have just passed the Legislature, much excitement, and even fancy prices, may be looked for, but it would be well to bear in mind, where the stock is sought as an investment, that the price of Fort Wayne and guaranteed 7 per cent stock is only 95, and that thus far the most promising prospect which Erie presents is the hope of a 2 to 3 per cent dividend.

THE MONEY MARKET.

has been unsettled and irregular during the week, the large volume of dealings in the Stock Exchange growing out of the excitement noted above creating an unusual demand, which was met, however, with the payment of a small commission.

THE BANK STATEMENT.

The weekly statement of the associated banks is without important feature except in showing a decrease of over four millions in deposits, reflecting a shipment of legal tenders to the treasury banks and a contraction in loans, both indicative of preparations for the April settlements.

GOVERNMENTS HIGHER.

The government list was strong and considerably higher on a sudden increase in the orders from the other side of the Atlantic, where the pacific reception of Secretary Fish's reply to the note of Earl Granville became the signal for a fresh investment in our securities.
