CAMARGO, Mexico, May 14. (By telegraph.)

The town of Mier was occupied yesterday by a force under the Jurista Colonel, Lozano. The revolutionists have retired on the Guarriso road, and the headquarters of General Treviño are at Chihuah. Treviño has divided his forces.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE ZACATECAS.

The revolutionary General, Garcia de la Cadená, is at Saltillo with a small force which has been saved from the battle of Zacatecas. He has also reinforced himself with the remaining men of General Pedro Martinez, and is about to return to Zacatecas to renew the fight for the possession of the city.
