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BROOKLYN BALLOT-BOX STUFFING.

Ex-Auditor O'Brien Denying Complicity in the Fraud—Alderman Dunne and Paddy Keenan Held to Bail.

There was a flutter among the politicians about the Brooklyn City Hall yesterday in consequence of the recent revelation in regard to the stuffing of the ballot boxes in the First district of the Sixth ward last November.

The statements of the convicted canvasser, William Weldon, and those purporting to have been made by John McKenna, at whose house, 35 Atlantic street, the polls were held, as published in the Herald, were expressed that more startling disclosures are to follow.

Ex-Auditor O'Brien, who has been implicated in the frauds by Thomas McGuff, another of the convicted canvassers, stoutly denied any knowledge whatever of the transactions.

Imposing Ceremonies at Steuben Yesterday.

UNVEILING OF THE MONUMENT.

Mr. Kappf, Ellis Roberts and Governor Seymour the Orators of the Day—A Tribute to Departed Worth.

UTICA, N. Y., Sept. 30, 1872. Large delegations from Utica, with several representatives of the press and German societies of New York, went to Henschen and Steuben this morning to be present at the unveiling of the Steuben monument.
