

THE AMERICAN BIBLE UNION.

Twenty-third Anniversary Meeting in the Mariners' Church—A Debt of \$2,400 Wiped Out—Reports, Addresses, &c. The American Bible Union—a Baptist organization for the revision of the Bible—held their twenty-third anniversary yesterday in the Mariners' church in Oliver street, near Chatham square.

At half-past nine o'clock A. M. a public meeting at half-past ten o'clock A. M. and a public meeting at half-past eleven o'clock A. M. were read and remarks thereon by gentlemen present. The Secretary's report was read by Mr. Wyckoff.
