

GERMANY AND FRANCE.

Serious Complications Concerning Spanish Affairs.

A DIPLOMATIC RUPTURE THREATENED.

PARIS, August 1, 1874.

I am enabled to inform the HERALD, on confidential authority, which may be relied upon, that serious complications have arisen between Germany and France concerning Spanish affairs, and that a diplomatic rupture between the Powers is threatened.

French Press Arguments in Favor of the Recognition of Spain.

PARIS, August 1, 1874.

The Journal des Debats urges the French government to recognize Spain. It had better act now, says the Journal, than follow the initiative of the Berlin government later. The danger is pointed out of allowing Germany to gain a footing in Spain.

French Opinion of Carlist.

Notwithstanding the late success of the Carlists at Estella and the death of Marshal Concha, the Paris Debats of July 21 cannot see that Don Carlos' cause has made any real way or acquired greater chances of ultimate triumph. The writer says:

The final issue of the war is no more doubtful to us than it was before, and our conviction is founded on the fact that the Carlist cause cannot be renewed, while the whole of Spain, with the exception of the Basque Provinces and Navarre, is always and everywhere in the hands of the Carlists. It is painful to have to admit that these complaints are unfounded. It is certain that since the commencement of the war the Carlists have been quiet at home on the French frontier; that the French troops are used by them as headquarters and depots; that arms and ammunition are forwarded to them with impunity across French territory, and some of their generals have been seen calmly riding in a luxurious staff-carriage, through the towns and highroads of France. There can be no doubt but that the Carlists have greatly contributed to prolong the war, and that the French government is responsible for this conduct. We cannot be astonished, therefore, if complaints have been made by Spain to the French government. It would be puerile to pretend that the present government of Spain has not been officially recognized. Certainly it is not for us to be so punctilious, and when one is, like our own government, in the habit of always and everywhere recognizing the Republic of France, it is not for us to pass without giving to the world the spectacle of some fresh piece of barbarism.

OBITUARY.

Charles F. Beke, the Explorer.

A cable telegram from London under date of yesterday, August 1, reports as follows:—"It is reported that Charles F. Beke, the explorer, is dead." This report may prove true. Charles F. Beke is seventy-three years of age. He was born in London on the 10th of October, in the year 1801, and was the representative of an ancient family long settled at Bekebourne, East Kent. He received a commercial education, but subsequently studied law in Lincoln's Inn. Eventually he resumed his mercantile avocation in London and the Mauritius. Having devoted much attention to ancient history, geography, philology and ethnography, he commenced to publish the results of his study in his "Origines Biliques," the attention was at an early date attracted towards Abyssinia as a centre of great commercial importance, and having the elucidation of his ideas in view, he proceeded to Shoa, in Southern Abyssinia, in the year 1841. Thence he went alone into the interior, where he explored Goddam and the countries lying to the west and south. The results of his travels were published, Beke attaining great distinction as a writer on geographical subjects and the comparative sciences. On the 4th of November, 1868, Dr. Beke, accompanied by Mrs. Beke, left England on a mission, which proved fruitless. He obtained the Abyssinian citizenship. He received a civil list pension from the English government in the year 1870. After his return to England he was appointed by the British government as an authority in all matters relating to Africa.

FRANCE.

BONAPARTIST INSULT TO THE REPUBLIC.

A Scene of Tumult and Violence in the Assembly.

The Bonapartists Ignored on the Permanent Committee.

PARIS, August 1, 1874.

There was a violent scene in the Assembly today. M. Galloni d'Istria, a Bonapartist, yesterday expressed the opinion that the Republic had succumbed before the scorn of honest men. To-day he was challenged by members of the Left to repeat the words, which he did. Thereupon Victor Schecher, republican, gave him the lie, and several deputies from the Left rushed toward him shouting and shaking their fists. The President of the Assembly, unable to restore order, suspended the sitting.

It is probable that several duels will follow.

WHY THE BONAPARTISTS ARE ENRAGED.

The Permanent Committee of the Assembly, when it sat during the recess, has been elected. It is composed of six legitimists, ten members of the Moderate Right and Right Centre and nine of the Left.

CUBA.

Merchants in Combination for the Aid of the Government.

HAVANA, August 1, 1874.

Fifty merchants of this city have entered into an agreement to charge one per cent above regular rates on all shipments and consignments or disbursements on behalf of vessels and on all freights obtained or moneys collected thereon, and one-quarter of one per cent on all bills of exchange negotiated on commission from and after this date, the proceeds of such extra charges to be paid to the government as a contribution towards its maintenance.

THE INDIANS.

Report from Captain Bates' Expedition—An Indian Village Surprised and the Occupants Severely Punished—Bad Conduct of the Indian Allies.

WASHINGTON, August 1, 1874.

The War Department has received a report of the expedition, under the command of Captain A. E. Bates, which left Camp Brown, Wyoming Territory, July 1, for the purpose of punishing the Indians who had been committing depredations in that and the neighboring valley. After several days' marching he reached the Indian village at Owl Creek Mountains, which consisted of 112 lodges, placed in a deep ravine. The Indians opened a sharp fire on the troops as they approached, but without damage, and the troops quickly drove them down through a gulley, where they were crowded so closely together near the lower end that the troops had a splendid chance at them, and could, after a very short and bloody fight, kill almost in one heap, in about twenty minutes or half an hour, at farthest, there were no more left standing. The expedition took dead and numbers of children, who were left in the lodges. The Indians who escaped had reached the lower end of the ravine, where they were firing on the troops, killing two men and wounding three in a very few minutes.
